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If a serious emergency were to occur that would require you to take action, the County would sound the Early Warning System sirens. The sirens are an indication to tune to a local radio or television station for emergency information and instructions.

When at sea, tune to Marine Channel 16.

The siren system is tested regularly throughout the year and may be used for any local emergency.

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
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

### There are many things to discover around SLO

The city of San Luis Obispo has much to see and do. It is the seat of county government, a popular dining and shopping destination and a traditional college town reflecting eclectic choices in art, entertainment, food and activities.

### **Attractions**

### The San Luis Obispo de Tolosa Mission

The San Luis Obispo de Tolosa mission is one of the best known historical sites in town. Founded by Father Junipero Serra in September 1772, the mission was the fifth of the California missions and named after Saint Louis, Bishop of Toulouse, France. For information about tours and the gardens or attending mass visit missionsanluisobispo.org.

### **Historical buildings**

Other historical buildings, many featuring unique architecture, include the Sinsheimer store with an iron front built in 1884 at 849 Monterey St., the Jack House at 536 Marsh Street, which was built in 1875, the State Historical Landmark Dallidet Adobe at 1185 Pacific St and the 1884 Ah Louis Store at 800 Palm St, originally a supply station for the Chinese laborers who built the railroad tunnels through the mountains of the Cuesta Grade.

The Madonna Inn, known worldwide for its elegant and quirky décor, has been a stop for visitors since first built in 1958. The inn, restaurant and over 100 rooms occupy 1000 acres of scenic Central Coast land.

The historic Carnegie Library on Monterey Street is home to the History Center of San Luis Obispo. Built in 1905, the library is one in a chain of over 1600 libraries funded by the United States by Scottish-American businessman and philanthropist Andrew Carnegie. The SLO Carnegie Museum is one of three still standing and in use on the Central Coast. The other two are located in Lompoc and Paso Robles.

### San Luis Obispo Botanical Gardens

Gardeners and outdoor enthusiasts are not left out. The San Luis Obispo Botanical gardens, on Highway 1 near Dairy Creek Road is the only garden in the United States exclusively featuring plants and ecosystems from the five Mediterranean climates in the world. The design includes miles of paved trails and shady resting spots and a variety of other activities.

### **Hiking and cycling**

The city's Parks and Recreation Department operates several parks that span 7000 acres of breathtaking views and hiking trails. Visit the website for the City of San Luis Obispo for park maps details about the ease or difficulty of the trails.

The city has over 75 miles of bike paths and what better way for cycling enthusiasts to enjoy a vacation. San Luis Obispo was designated a Bicycle Friendly Community by the League of American Bicyclists in 2007. Visit bikeslocounty.org for cycling maps for the City of San Luis Obispo, wine trails and other locations in San Luis Obispo County.



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# San Luis Obispo Farmers' Market is a feast for the senses

### Let's all go to Farmers'

Who doesn't love a good farmers' market? The Downtown SLO Farmers' Market, or just "farmers" as the locals call it, however, is more than just a farmers' market. It's an icon, a cornerstone of the San Luis Obispo community, and an absolute must-do during any trip to the Central Coast.

This beloved Thursday evening event reimagines five blocks of downtown San Luis Obispo into a vibrant community gathering, featuring over 100 vendors serving up everything from farm-fresh produce to the region's famous Santa Maria-style barbecue.

#### A feast for the senses

Farmers is a wonderful place to meet up with friends or get lost in a


crowd. The aroma of tri-tip smoking over red oak wood mingles with the scent of fresh kettle corn and

local delicacies, creating an irresistible sensory experience that draws thousands of visitors each week.

Local farmers display seasonal bounty from the fertile Central Coast soil— strawberries from Santa Maria, avocados from Morro Bay, and fresh citrus from inland valleys. Artists and craftspeople showcase their work alongside local musicians who provide the evening's soundtrack, from acoustic guitar to jazz ensembles.

### From cruising to community

The market's origins tell a unique story of community problem-solving. According to Downtown SLO, in the late 1970s, downtown merchants faced an unexpected challenge when cruising culture took over Higuera street



on Thursday nights, deterring shoppers from visiting local businesses. In response, the Downtown Association (now Downtown SLO) turned this challenge into an opportunity by closing the street to traffic and inviting merchants to bring their business outdoors.

What started as a creative solution to a local problem has evolved into one of the Central Coast's most cherished traditions, drawing visitors from across California and beyond. Cal Poly students mingle with longtime residents and tourists, creating a dynamic atmosphere that epitomizes San Luis Obispo's friendly, small-town charm.

### A local's guide to the market

Start your market experience at the intersection of Higuera and Nipomo streets, where the aroma of barbecue leads you to multiple tri-tip vendors.

As you stroll up the street, you'll find a diverse array of prepared foods, from authentic Thai cuisine to wood-fired pizzas. Continue to head towards the market's boundary on Osos street to find the farm-

ers' stands, where seasonal produce creates a colorful display of the region's agricultural abundance.

Live entertainment spots are scattered throughout the market, with the primary performance area near the intersection of Higuera and Morro streets.

For dessert, follow the sweet scents to local bakeries' stands or the popular kettle corn vendor. Many downtown restaurants also offer market-night specials.

### Planning your visit

Today, visitors can experience this iconic market every Thursday evening on Higuera Street, with vendors, barbecues, and entertainment kicking off at 6 p.m.

The market runs year-round, adjusting its hours seasonally, staying open until 9 p.m. during the warmer months (March through October) and closing slightly earlier at 8:30 p.m. in winter (November through February). Just keep in mind that the market takes a break on federal holidays and rainy days (check their website by 10 a.m. PST on market day if the weather looks questionable).

Farmers' Market is where families establish weekly traditions, and where visitors can experience the authentic charm that makes SLO one of California's most beloved small cities.

# San Luis Obispo Winds Orchestra and the passion of volunteers

### A history of music with a purpose

The San Luis Obispo Winds Orchestra, known as SLO Winds, has been entertaining San Luis Obispo County since its first performance on December 31, 1999, at the Old Mission Church in San Luis Obispo.

December 2024 marked the 25th anniversary of the 45-member volunteer, wind and percussion orchestra. Founder William V. Johnson was the director of bands at Cal Poly, and SLO Winds was his passion project and gift to the community. The pinnacle of his tenure was the "Queen Symphony" which included a 150-voice choir, organ, and strings.

Over the years SLO Winds has continued to grow, and now each season they perform a series of five to six concerts. Current musical director, Jennifer Martin continues the legacy.

Martin is passionate about bringing professional quality wind music to the Central Coast. According to Martin, "SLO Winds is not only the largest volunteerdriven musical arts non-profit on the Central Coast but also boasts musicians who perform at

a professional level despite their volunteer status. Our members are deeply passionate about wind band music, volunteering their time out of love for this art form."

The volunteer musicians come from a variety of different careers ranging from a microbiologist to a retired clergyman and it seems everything in between. It's an eclectic group, and each member can be sponsored on the SLO Winds website. With the funds they raise from the main-stage concerts, they host two free children's concerts annually and visit assisted living centers to offer free concerts to seniors dozens of times each year. It's music with a purpose.

According to Martin, "Our repertoire is selected with care to offer a broad representation of

wind band literature, balancing classics with contemporary pieces. We are dedicated to showcasing the



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finest works, providing both our musicians and audience with a rich, musical experience"



# Mission San Luis Obispo: A living legacy in the heart of downtown

Founded in 1772, the mission continues to serve the community

Mission San Luis Obispo de Tolosa, founded in 1772 by Franciscan missionaries, is the fifth of the 21 Spanish missions established in Alta California. The mission has always been situated near its present location, close to the water of San Luis Creek. Located in the heart of downtown San Luis Obispo, the old mission has become a historical treasure admired by visitors from all over the world.

The gardens have grown and evolved over centuries. The grape arbor is reminiscent of the vineyards that once filled acres around the mission. Over time, staff and guests have added more plants and trees to the garden. Visitors are encouraged to bring a book, find a bench and take a rest in the garden.

Learn more about the history of the mission on a docent-led tour. Guided tours start at 1:15 p.m. Monday - Saturday and at 2 p.m. on Sunday and begin in front of the gift shop. One-month advance notification is required for group tours of 10 or more. Reservation forms are available on the mission website, or call (805) 781-8220.

The docents enjoy sharing their love of the old mission. You will learn how the Mission grew in stages, who is buried in the floors of the church, and the story behind the centuries-old art still hanging from the adobe walls. The mission, originally constructed from rudimentary thatch, bows, and logs, grew to the substantial walls and tile roofs still standing today. In contrast to some missions, the San Luis Obispo mission never fell into complete ruin or abandonment during and following the secularization period under the Mexican government. The original church consisted only of the main wing leading to the

sanctuary and altar. In the 1880s and again in 1948, the annex wing was extended in stages to provide seating for the rapidly growing San Luis Obispo community.

The Mission museum and the gift shop are housed in the Convento Wing, the original living quarters of the friars. The museum displays artifacts from Native Californian, Mission Era, and American settlement. The gift shop offers an eclectic collection of crafts, jewelry, art and books, with a friendly staff ready to help and answer questions. Proceeds from the gift shop help maintain the mission.

Pilgrims and visitors of many faith traditions find the quiet and peace of the Old Mission Church, its grounds and gardens, to be a place of rest and renewal for the spirit. Unlike many California missions, the church of San Luis Obispo de Tolosa does not charge admission but welcomes donations, and its doors are open most days of the year. There are two daily masses and six masses on the weekend in English and Spanish.

# Bubblegum Alley: A sweet and sticky San Luis Obispo landmark

Unique tourist attraction where memories stick around

Bubblegum Alley is a tourist attraction in downtown San Luis Obispo, California, known for its accumulation of used bubble gum on the walls of an alley. Located in the 700 block of Higuera Street, the 15-foothigh and 70-foot-long alley is lined with chewed gum left by passers-by.

It's not completely clear how bubblegum alley got started Some historians believe that the tradition of putting gum in the alley started after WWII as a San Luis Obispo High School graduating class event. Others

believe it started in the late 1950s, as rivalry between San Luis Obispo High School and California Polytechnic State University students. By the 1970s, Bubblegum Alley was well established and has survived two thorough cleanings.

Throughout the years, San Luis Obispo's Bubblegum Alley has been featured on a number of television shows, news programs, and in newspapers around the world such as the New York times and the Los Angeles Times, The San Francisco Chronicle and Ripley's Believe it or Not. "Weird Al" Yankovic mentioned Bubblegum Alley in his 1978 song "Take Me Down," an ode to San Luis Obispo. Our local Bubblegum Alley shares fame with its Seattle counterpart; the only two such landmarks on the West Coast.

Agreement whether these gumcovered walls should remain a part of quaint downtown San Luis Obispo has not been reached since its founding. While some locals consider this alley to be an "eyesore," the Chamber of Commerce lists it as a "special attraction." Store owners' complaints concerning upkeep are countered by the argument that it increases foot traffic and business.

The Alley has inspired professional artists such as Matthew Hoffman. On the east end of the alley, up high on the north-facing wall, a giant self-portrait of Hoffman titled "Projectbubble Gum" is created entirely with bubble gum. The picture of the artist blowing a bubble required a tremendous amount of gum, which he was able to get with the help of the community.

Bubblegum Alley has a four-star Yelp rating for Landmarks & Historical Buildings. Here's what some of the visitors have had to say:

"It was in 2009 when a Sagittarius man brought me to this yummi candy smelling alley. At first I was confused then I realized he liked me. He actually failed miserably not to kiss me." Laura N., Huntington Beach, CA

# Croma Vera Wines celebrates a unique 10-year approach to Central Coast winemaking

San Luis Obispo's Croma Vera Wines marks its 10th anniversary this year, showcasing a continued commitment to bringing unique, Spanish-inspired wines to California's Central Coast. Located in Duncan Alley, San Luis Obispo's emerging urban beverage district,

Croma Vera has carved out a niche with wines like albariño, tempranillo, graciano, and bold red blends sourced from sustainably farmed local vineyards.

### Spanish-style wines on the Central Coast

In an interview, owner Mindy Oliver discussed the winery's dedication to Spanish varietals, citing factors that influenced this direction. "Spanish wines like albariño and tempranillo are simply delicious, offering distinctive flavors that bring something unique," Oliver said. A focus on Spanishstyle wines differentiates the winery



from the region's many chardonnay and pinot noir producers, allowing Croma Vera to offer visitors a unique tasting experience.

Oliver explained that the Central Coast's climate and soil are similar to Spain's wine regions, providing a natural fit for these varietals. "If you trace a line of latitude from Ribera del Duero, you'll land close to Paso Robles—a perfect parallel for these exceptional Spanish varietals," she said, noting that this climate enhances the structure and richness of the winery's tempranillo.

Edna Valley's cool coastal climate draws out the crisp acidity and minerality in albariño, a varietal originally from the coast in Galicia in Spain. "This coastal influence gives our wines their distinct balance and freshness," she said.

### **Celebrating 10 years**

"Our goal is to introduce our wines in a casual and relaxed environment. We're kid-friendly and dog-friendly" says Oliver.

Oliver said the winery's proudest achievement has been building a



strong sense of community among its followers. "Seeing our wine club grow and knowing that people genuinely enjoy our wines and look forward to each new release has been incredibly rewarding."




#### Hiking

### **Attractions**

#### **Dinosaur Caves Park**

There is a small cost per vehicle to drive on the beach and it is recommended you have a larger vehicle before attempting to drive on the dry sand; you don't want to get stuck in the dunes.

#### Ocean views

Pismo Beach is home to several parks with beautiful, panoramic views of the Pacific Ocean and birds and marine life that live and migrate through the Central Coast. A few of the most popular parks with exquisite views, trails, places to rest, picnic and enjoy the scenery include:

· Chumash Park covers 38-acres of

wetlands, willows, oaks and is home to a rich variety of birds and wildlife. Bring a camera. Leashed dogs are welcome.

- Eldwayen Ocean Park meanders over a mile along the bluffs and has stairs down to the beach and the tidepools. Check a tide chart to visit during low tide to explore the tidepools.
- Margo Dodd Park, located on a bluff above the ocean includes breathtaking panoramas of the ocean, beaches and surrounding areas. Bring binoculars and a camera. Walk the sandy beach to a tidepool at the end of Pier Street.

### Hiking and scenic walks at the Pismo Preserve

The preserve provides over 11 miles of trails wandering through 880-acres of oak woodlands and coastal ridges and some of the most stunning panoramic views of the Pacific Ocean and surrounding land and beaches. Trails are marked for the direction of travel. Park is open weekdays from sunup to sunset.

### **Price Historical Park**

# **Choose your adventure at Oceano Dunes State Park**

Rent an OHV, camp overnight, hike, fish, and enjoy the beach year-round

A vehicle recreation destination since the early 1900s, Oceano Dunes is California's only off-highway vehicle (OHV) recreation area on the Pacific Ocean. Established as a state park in 1974, the long stretch of beach fronts 3600 acres of open space, including 1500 acres for OHVs. Over 1.6 million visit this unique park annually to ride the dunes, camp, swim, surf, fish, hike, bird watch, and explore.

# Come for the day or the camping

Oceano Dunes is open daily from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. for vehicle day use. Passes are \$5 per vehicle, on first-come-first-serve at the entry kiosks at Grand Avenue in Grover Beach and Pier Avenue in Oceano.

All vehicles must display current registration. OHVs must be hauled in and off-loaded at a designated location.

Leashed dogs are welcome in the park but may not be at nearby attractions.

Camping, at \$10 per vehicle per night, is primitive beach and dune camping with no designated campsites. Facilities include vault and chemical toilets. Make camping reservations up to six months in advance at Reserve California, reservecalifornia.com/Web/.

#### Map your adventure

Don't forget a map from a kiosk or the Oceano Dunes Visitor Center at 555 Pier Ave. The center, open daily from noon to 4 p.m., is packed with exhibits about the Chumash, the unique Bohemian Dunite community, and much more.

The map identifies important locations within the park, especially along Sand Highway. Sand Highway is named for its expansive sand dunes, stunning coastal views, and access to nature trails offering chances to explore and enjoy the landscape, coastal vegetation, and wildlife.

OHVs allowed in the park include ATVs/UTVs, off-road motorcycles, some dirt bikes, sand rails, and dune buggies. Four-wheel drive vehicles are highly recommended. Even then, high tides, heavy rains, and blowing sand can get you stuck.

"Riders are encouraged to explore and scout routes. Ride within your experience and ability," said Oceano Dunes District Planning Chief, Roger Jacobs. "Don't hesitate to ask park rangers or more experienced riders for tips. They're here to help you have a great time. Enjoy the thrill, take in the beautiful scenery, and remember, the more you practice, the more fun it gets."

Hikers, horseback riders, and wildlife also enjoy the park. Remember to yield when you encounter them so that everyone has a great time.

Detailed safety information is available at ohv.parks.ca.gov/?page\_id=1207. The State of California has partnered with the All-Terrain Vehicle Safety Institute (ASI) to conduct regular OHV training and certification sessions at the park. For more information visit atvsafety.org.

If you missed out on the local farm fresh roadside stands, the chances are the same farmers are at the Arroyo Grande Farmer's Market.

#### **Lopez Lake Recreation Area**

Located just 10 miles east of Arroyo Grande, Lopez Lake has close to 1000 acres of lake surface for boating, fishing, canoeing and windsurfing. The lake has a launch ramp, tackle shop, and many other amenities for water sport enthusiasts. The oak tree studded open space offers hiking and equestrian trails and is home to more than 175 species of flowering plants, more than 150 species of birds and all of the wildlife that calls the region home. N ipomo is a small town on the mesa in the southern area of San Luis Obispo County that is known for its stands of eucalyptus trees, expansive golf courses and special outdoor and nature experiences.

Nipomo preserves a spirit of true frontier land even while modern businesses thrive in its commercial areas. Standing on the wet sand of the shore of the Pacific, looking out over the sprawling Guadalupe-Nipomo Dunes toward the rich, riparian woods, creeks, fresh water lakes and the Santa Maria River, one imagines seeing the same views that the original Chumash saw while going about their daily activities. The word "nipomo" means "base of the hills" in the Chumash language.

Bostonian sea captain, Captain William G. Dana acquired a land grant in 1837, and settled the 37,888-acre Rancho Nipomo. His adobe house still stands near the 101 Freeway.

### **Attractions**

#### **Guadalupe-Nipomo Dunes**

The 3,400-acre Guadalupe-Nipomo Dunes Preserve is one of the largest remaining coastal dune systems in the nation and is a mustsee excursion for hikers, naturalists and bird-watchers. Catch glimpses of more than 200 varieties of birds and view more than 120 imperiled plants and animals within the preserve's National Wildlife Refuge and surrounding dune habitat.

#### **Nipomo Native Gardens**

A forest of native plants and trees are maintained by volunteers from the Nipomo Native Gardens Society. The Nipomo Native Garden is a 12-acre site located between Pomeroy, Camino Caballo and Osage, nipomonativegarden.org.

#### Nipomo Swap Meet

The huge Nipomo Swap Meet and Flea market is on the grounds adjacent to the 101 Freeway at the Teft Street off-ramp. The Nipomo Swap Meet & Flea market combines great family entertainment with old school swap meet atmosphere. It is the largest swap meet on California's Central Coast and is open Sunday only 6 a.m. - 4 p.m. \$4 Parking. No dogs. Visit nipomoswapmeets.com or call (805) 929-7000 for more information.


#### Dana Adobe Historical Landmark and Cultural Center

os Osos, Spanish for "Valley of the Bears", is off the beaten path and the gateway to Montana de Oro, an amazing state park along the ocean. The town has many quaint places of interest for visitors to stop on their way to and from the state park. Try one of the many restaurants or grab something to take with you for a picnic at the beach or one of the nearby forests.

#### Montana de Oro

The park is well-used with daily visitors throughout the year who go there to hike, picnic, fish, camp, surf, take a dip in the ocean or visit the tide pools. The park's visitor center is located at Spooner's Ranch House Museum above Spooner's Cove. The park is free to enter. (805) 528-0513. For camping call (800) 444-7275.

#### **Elfin Forest**

The forest has nearly 200 species of plants, more than 100

varieties of birds, and many species of mammals and reptiles and amphibians. The forest includes a 1-mile boardwalk that is wheelchair accessible at the north end of 16th Street. Guided tours are given on the third Saturday of each month at 9:30 am starting at the north end of 15th Street off Santa Ysabel. (805) 528-0392.

#### **Baywood Pier**

The pier, at the intersection of 2nd Street and El Morro Ave., overlooks the shores of the back bay of Morro Bay. The Los Osos Oaks State Reserve Half-mile east of South Bay Boulevard on the south side of Los Osos Valley Road. The reserve has an easy one-mile trail through the "Pygmy Oaks", which are dwarfed coast live oaks. The low canopy reserve is on the site where Chumash once lived.

#### **Los Osos Community Park**

Located at the corner of Los Osos Valley Road and Palisades Avenue, the park includes a 17,000-square-foot skate park, three tennis courts, playgrounds and restrooms. The park is ideal for walking or picnicking and is the site of the Los Osos Valley School, one of five original one-room schoolhouses between San Luis Obispo and the coast. Of those five, only two still exist today, both in Los Osos.

# Sweet Springs Nature Preserve

Located on the north end of Ramona Avenue between Broderon and 4th Street, the park is open from dawn to dusk and has trails that wander through the Monterey cypress and eucalyptus trees around two freshwater ponds and a salt marsh to the edge of Morro Bay.

#### Baywood Park Farmers' Market

On Santa Maria Avenue between 2nd and 3rd streets. The market takes place every Monday from 2-4:30 p.m. (805) 748-1109.

#### **Bear statues**

On your way into Los Osos notice the large grizzlies stationed as guards into the town at South Bay Boulevard and Los Osos Valley Road. The statues were created by local artist Paula Zima.

# Foggy Bottom Distillery, crafted spirits in a coastal village

Small but mighty distillery produces an array of corn whiskeys, bourbons, rye's, gins, and spiced rums

Winer Todd Adams opened Foggy Bottom Distillery in the often-foggy coastal village of Los Osos in March of 2017. The small but mighty distillery produces a wide array of spirits including corn whiskeys, bourbons, ryes, gins, and spiced rums.

Adams says he enjoys creating new variations of spirits, "Distilling is a very good fit for my personality and lifestyle," he says. "I enjoy using the tasting room as a social outlet. I am normally a very private person," he says. "Plus I have a captive audience and they have to laugh at all my jokes and wild stories."

Adams loves to give distillery tours to his patrons, who often will ask incredulously, "You make everything in here?" His reply is, "Yes, all 35 plus spirits were made in here! That is when they are really blown away; seeing that the distillery is the size of a small walkin closet."

Finding a location for his distillery was no easy feat, according to Adams. He says that being a distillery was a deterrent for many

leasing agents. Adams also works as a county building inspector and said that one day on the job he was inspecting the building that houses Martin's restaurant for a remodel when he said jokingly that there was an unusual condition on the permit: that 100-square feet be dedicated to a craft distiller. After some convincing and a whiskey tasting, the owners agreed to let

Adams open his distillery in a small 100-square-foot room. They would later alter the plans for the distillery to add a deck for the tasting room. Adams also has an off-site barrel room for aging.

Adams is a busy man; inspecting during the week and giving tastings every weekend. You may even find him running the still, which he says he did often up until the COVID-19 pandemic hit. During the pandemic, Adams joined several other local distillers in making an immediate pivot to producing hand sanitizer. Foggy Bottom sold half of it and gave the other half away, "I just wanted to make my money back on it." Adams said.

#### The future of Foggy


Adams has big plans for the future of Foggy Bottom. He says he plans on retiring from the county building department in about 3 years, after which he will be able to devote more time to growing the business. He says he can have three locations with his current license, and if he adds a restaurant he can have a full bar. "My little brother is working on having a location near his home in Roseville California," he says. He has big plans for the restaurant, he says, "but I don't want to give up those secrets yet."

Foggy Bottom is open for tastings on Saturdays from noon - 7 p.m. and Sundays from noon - 6 p.m. "If you come for a tasting, you will be entertained by my telling of the Foggy Bottom story," says Adams. Drinks and entertainment? Sign me up!

Explore the natural beauty of Morro Bay, a town famous for its fog and fishing. Whether for a day or a week, this small town by the Rock has something for everyone.

Morro Bay is bursting with exciting activities to try. There's deep sea fishing, whale watching, world-class surfing, hiking, biking, and kayaking.

When it comes to birdwatching, there's little doubt that Morro Bay provides the best chance for observing a great variety of species. It's an incredible birding spectacle. There are also harbor seals, sea lions, and sea otters.

Looking to take a slower pace? Stroll down the Embarcadero and browse gift shops and art galleries. Explore the local cuisine and dine on fresh caught fish. Sit on a bench in Tidelands Park and watch the boats leaving the harbor or take a walk on the beach and watch the waves. Walk out the harbor boardwalk to Morro Rock, the 576-foot volcanic plug that looms over the bay and seashore. Keep an eye out for sea otters that rest in the kelp beds near the shore.

### **Attractions**

#### Morro Bay Maritime Museum

This museum has been preserving and interpreting the maritime history, especially that of California since 1995. The current fleet on exhibit includes the tug boat "Alma" that rescued sailors from the December 1941 Japanese attack on a Union Oil tanker off the coast of Morro Bay and the "Avalon," one of two Deep Submergence Rescue Vehicles (DSRV) submarines designed to rescue crews of downed submarines. The museum is located at 1210 Embarcadero in Morro Bay. For hours visit morrobaymaritime.org.

#### **Morro Bay State Park**

Morro Bay State Park, located at 60 State Park Rd. Morro Bay, features lagoon and bay habitat, all in view of Morro Rock. The park has opportunities for sailing, fishing, hiking and bird watching and features a marina and an 18-hole golf course. The Morro Bay Golf Course is located at 201 State Park Rd. Call (805) 772-1923 for hours and tee times.

The park is a California state park, visit parks.ca.gov for information about parking, hours and other attractions.

#### **North Point Natural Area**

Operated by the City of Morro Bay, the North Point Natural Area has a stairway that leads down to the beach. Once on the beach, people can walk north to Cayucos or south to Morro Rock. The beach has one of the best tidepool areas. In the spring, the meadow is full of blooming wildflowers. The entry is located on Toro Lane in Morro Bay.

#### **Black Hill Trail**

Located at Main St and Parkview Dr., this 2.5 mile trail is a moderate hike. The trail is a favorite spot for nature walks and birdwatching. Leashed dogs are welcome.

#### Giant chessboard at Centennial Parkway

According to the United States Chess Federation, the Giant Chessboard at Centennial Parkway, 806 Embarcadero, is only one of two outdoor chessboards in the United States. The other is located in New York City. The Morro Bay Chess Club installed chess tables and benches adjacent to the Giant Chessboard. The Giant Chessboard is available for reservations, Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., through the Morro Bay Recreation Services for a small fee. Visitors are always welcomed to join the Morro Bay Chess Club on Saturdays beginning at noon. For more information call (805) 772-6278



A guide for the day, from morning coffee to dinner

Looking for the ideal day trip along California's Central Coast? Morro Bay offers smalltown charm and maritime adventure, perfect for those craving fresh seafood, wildlife encounters, or unique shopping. This guide will help you make the most of your time in this relaxed coastal destination.

Morro Bay's skyline stands out along the SLO County coastline, anchored by two iconic landmarks: the 576-foot volcanic Morro Rock and the three smokestacks from the decommissioned power plant. Just 12 miles from San Luis Obispo, the town makes for an ideal day trip and a strategic base for exploring the county.

#### **Morning adventures**

Start with a warm cup of coffee from a local shop while watching surfers catch waves at Morro Strand State Beach. When you're ready for breakfast, head to Frankie and Lola's Front Street Cafe on the Embarcadero. The crab cake benedict is a favorite among locals, while the chorizo scramble is another popular choice.

Once you're fueled up, wander the Embarcadero's waterfront shops. Beads By The Bay offers coastal-inspired jewelry and garden art, while nearby Main Street has even more unique finds. For art lovers, the Morro Bay Art Center at 835 Main Street hosts rotating exhibits by Central Coast artists. A block over, David J Rogers Fine Art Gallery captures the area's land-scapes in various media.

#### **Midday exploration**

For an intimate view of the bay, book a Central Coast Gondola tour. These 50-minute cruises offer close-

up encounters with the harbor's wildlife, including sea lions and otters.

When hunger calls, head to Bayside Cafe at 10 State Park Road, a local favorite overlooking the marina. The fish tacos are popular, but it's the clam chowder in a sourdough bread bowl that steals the show. The dog-friendly patio provides views of the estuary, making it an ideal lunch spot.

Nearby, Morro Bay State Park offers hiking trails and the Museum of Natural History. For a \$3 admission fee (children under 6 free), visitors can explore interactive exhibits about the estuary's ecosystem. The Marina Peninsula Trail provides excellent bird-watching opportunities among the area's 250 species.

#### **Afternoon discoveries**

Morro Bay is known for its antique shops, so if you're still in the mood to explore, visit Rich Man-Poor Man Antiques at 2110 Main Street. The store's maritime section includes authentic pieces from local fishing vessels.

#### **Dinner delights**

As the day winds down, consider returning to Morro Strand

for a sunset stroll with a coffee in hand. For dinner, book a Chablis Cruise, a 2.5-hour evening voyage with fresh seafood and scenic views of the harbor lights.

Another great dinner option is Dorn's Original Breakers Cafe, where the heated patio offers panoramic bay views and freshcaught seafood.

#### **Visitor tips**

 Morro Bay's coastal climate calls for layers, as mornings may be foggy until around 11 a.m., and evenings stay cool year-round.


- Remember to maintain a respectful distance from wildlife, including seals and sea otters.
- Most shops are open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., and some retaurants take a break between lunch and dinner.
- Free parking is available at the Morro Rock lot and near the state park.
- For special experiences like Chablis Cruises and Central Coast Gondola tours, reservations are recommended.
   Popular restaurants like Dorn's also suggest weekend dinner reservations.

Respect the rock! Morro Rock, known as "Lisamu" to the indigenous Northern Chumash people, is more than just a scenic backdrop. This sacred site has been a spiritual center for thousands of years, playing a crucial role in Northern Chumash ceremonies and cultural practices. While visitors can admire its majesty from the beach or harbor, climbing the rock is prohibited both for safety reasons and to preserve its cultural significance.

After just a day in Morro Bay, you'll see why this unpretentious coastal town captures the hearts of visitors and locals alike. It's a place where time slows down, nature takes center stage, and the simple pleasures of coastal life are a reminder of what truly matters.





# Morro Bay Bird Festival celebrates 28 years of flying high

Registration open now for 5 activity packed days

Prom January 16-20, 2025, the Morro Bay Bird Festival celebrates 28 years of attracting bird enthusiasts to the Central Coast. This year's festival offers the most extensive list of activities yet. With over 250 events led by 141 expert leaders, beginners to seasoned birders find activities suited for their interests.

Considered one of the top five bird festivals in the nation, the five days of events include destination field trips to habitats including Carrizo Plain, Kern National Wildlife Refuge, Oso Flaco and Point Buchon, birding by bike, bay cruises and kayaking, master classes,

journaling and sketching and more.

There are opportunities for boating tours, and the pelagic trips onto the

ocean can turn up sightings of whales, dolphins, albatross, and more. Inland tours are to ranch lands and oak woodlands offering sightings of raptors, and meadowlarks, bluebirds, woodpeckers, and more.

Guided Big Days of Birding offer the potential to identify over 100 species at hot spots throughout San Luis Obispo County. There are also Casual Big Days at a slower pace for beginning and intermediate birders. A special effort is made to sight regional specialties and rarities during the many opportunities for up-close observations.

Along with all of the birding activities, participants can visit the Atascadero beavers, learn more about the southern sea otters, the 19 species of bats found on the Central Coast, visit the elephant seals and monarch butterfly over-wintering sites, explore mushrooms, learn to use birding technologies with a cell phone, and map making.

#### Meet the VIPs



#### This year's VIPS include:

- David Lindo, known as the urban birder, is a broadcaster, writer, educator dedicated to inspiring city dwellers worldwide to appreciate their environment through birds. He has contributed numerous articles on urban bird conservation and wildlife to various publications and is a familiar face on BBC, ITV, and Channel 4, among others.
- Kenn Kaufman, renowned naturalist and author, began his birding journey at age six. He gained fame as a teenage birder hitchhiking across North America to observe bird species. Kaufman has authored numerous books, including the popular Kaufman Field Guides series, and received multiple honors for his contributions to ornithology.
- Kimberly Kaufman has dedicated her career to bird conservation and education. As the executive director of the Black Swamp Bird Observatory, she has significantly impacted birding initiatives, including founding the Ohio Young Birders Club and organizing The Biggest Week in American Birding festival. A contributing editor for Birds & Blooms magazine and coauthor of several field guides, Kimberly received the 2015 American Birding Association's Chandler Robbins Award for her contributions to bird education and conservation.
- Jon Dunn, a renowned ornithologist, has been passionate about birds since childhood. He has authored numerous influential books on bird identification and distribution, including collaborations with Kimball Garrett and Jonathan Alderfer. Dunn has served on prestigious ornithological committees and contributed significantly to the National Geographic Society's bird guides. His expertise includes history and the works of Leonard Cohen.

Please leave the tidepools exactly as you found them. Tidepools are special, fragile systems and disturbing the animals and plants can cause harm.

#### **Fishing**

Fishing on the pier and from the shore of Cayucos State Beach is a favorite activity for locals and visitors. No fishing license is needed. Surf fishing is also allowed but a license is needed. Deep sea fishing is also available from local commercial fishing businesses.

#### **Beach activities**

The Cayucos State Beach stretches five miles south to Morro Bay. Run, jog, or walk as far as you like. Leashed dogs are welcome. Other beach activities include surfing, boogie boarding, kayaking or sitting in the sand and building sand castles.

The laid-back vibes of Cayu-L cos blend perfectly with the relaxed atmosphere of Schooners. Just steps away from the beach, you can drop your beach blanket in the car and walk directly into the restaurant. It's all about the views and the seafood for this Cayucos institution.

It's been a favorite of both locals and visitors since 1994 when founder Bill Larkin purchased the 1930s building and transformed it into the restaurant and bar it is today. The famous upstairs bar was once an apartment, and many locals still remember the woman who lived there for many years.

the overhead heaters keep the chill at bay. Adjacent to the deck is the famous bar. It's small and cozy and feels like you've stepped into a beach town bar of old movies.

The current owner, Brendan Fritzsche, bought Schooners in 2010. He had opened a restaurant in Hawaii, but the lure of the Central Coast brought him and his family back. However, his Hawaii days are evident in the welcoming and charming atmosphere at Schooners, where he brought his love of music. Locals and visitors can belt out their favorite tunes at the Wednesday, 7 p.m. open-mic nights.

Free live music plays on Saturday and Sunday from May to October. "There's a lot of great talent," says Fritzsche. He loves supporting talented local and traveling musicians. From Labor Day to Memorial Day, guests can enjoy happy hour specials. Schooner's is famous for its bloody marys and margaritas. They also have craft cocktails, local wines, and many draft beers.





The charming village of Cambria is filled with unique shops, galleries, and restaurants serving all kinds of delicious food. The shops have everything from antiques, specialty items, household gadgets, exquisite jewelry, and art from the quirky to traditional. Walking through the village, along flower-filled yards and shady trees, the well-maintained buildings, many dating from the 1800s, all come together in a sense of how life in a more tranquil time must have been.

Cambria is also known as the gateway to Hearst Castle, glorious ocean scenery along Highway 1, and during the month of October, is the heart of the Cambria Scarecrow Festival. The festival is an outdoor display of whimsical handmade scarecrows that draws visitors from all over.

### **Attractions**

#### Historical walking tour

Visit the Cambria Historical Society website (cambriahistoricalsociety.com) for a map of a walking tour of Cambria's historical buildings. The self-guided tour encompasses 28 buildings and the map includes a written history of each one. Learn the fascinating history of these old buildings and how their uses evolved from the original business or residence to their current occupations. Learn a little about the people and families who shaped Cambria's early years.

#### Visit the elephant seals

The elephant seal rookery extends six miles along the shoreline near Point Piedras Blancas in the Hearst San Simeon State Park. The seals may be seen all year but the largest populations are present during late January, April and October. Visit the Friends of the Elephant Seal website at elephantseal.org for information about the best viewing times and spots.

#### The Hearst San Simeon State Park

The state park encompasses the Moonstone Beach, the Santa Rosa Creek Natural Preserve, the San Simeon Natural Preserve and the Pa-Nu Cultural Preserve.

- Santa Rosa Creek Preserve includes valuable riparian forests and coastal wetlands, that provide habitat for endangered Tidewater Goby.
- San Simeon Natural Preserve covers vast wetlands, riparian areas, and several undisturbed native plant communities and is a wintering site for monarch butterflies.
- The 13.7 acre Pa-nu Cultural Preserve contains an archaeological site dated to 5850 years before the present era. The site holds significant evidence of prehistoric technology and life patterns.

A 3.3 mile trail runs through parts of the San Simeon Natural Preserve, with a portion of the trail being wheelchair accessible. The trail includes scenic overlooks, rest-stop benches and interpretive panels. The park address is 500 San Simeon Creek Road, Cambria. Call (805) 927-2010 for information about days and times the park is open.

#### **Nitt Witt Ridge**

This California Registered Historical Landmark #939 is famous for the artistic use of recycled materials used in its construction. Reclusive artist Arthur Harold Beal purchased the land in 1928 and spent the next 50 years creating his own version of a castle. Building materials include beer cans, concrete, washing machines, car parts, old stoves and abalone shells. Call (805) 927-2690 to arrange a tour.





# Cambria's Chumash mural honors ancient traditions and culture

Preserving
Indigenous history
through visual
storytelling

A mural by Chumash artist John Khus, celebrating the Chumash heritage adorns the front of the US Post Office in the Cambria's East Village.

Chumash territory spanned 7000 square miles ranging from Malibu to Cambria and east to the edge of the San Joaquin Valley. Cambria is home to two Chumash village sacred sites that have been continuously occupied for 10,000 years. So, it made sense for the Chumash Council and Beautify Cambria to collaborate on a project to honor this rich history.

John Khus was selected to create a mural that celebrated the tribe's history as the first people of San Luis Obispo County and the new Chumash Heritage Marine Sanctuary.

Marine Sanctuar The sanctuary is America's 17th national marine sanctuary, and it's one of the largest at 5543 square miles along 116 miles of coastline. Khus drew

inspiration from

Cuyama rock paintings, Canaliño rock paintings, and Ventureño rock paintings to create the mural, "Tomol Rides Wishtoyo."

The mural tells the story of a Chumash elder watching over a tomol (canoe) full of human spirits traveling over a rainbow, known as Wishtoyo, to meet their ances-

tors. According to Khus, tomol crews knew the journey would be dangerous and "their connection to the spirit world would be very high during their time on the ocean."

Every image in "Tomol Rides Wishtoyo" pays homage to

the Chumash people and helps to educate visitors as well. So, what exactly does everything mean?

The large rainbow is called a Wishtoyo.



the sacred. The face of a Chumash leader is called a Wot. He would represent the voices of their people at councils and with the nation. The Wot worked closely with the people, medicine bearers, and the storytellers to make sure everything was in balance.

The tomol is the traditional Chumash canoe. The Chumash had many tomol fleets, and this enabled them to share, fish, and travel. Inspired by a Cuyama rock painting, Khus included a dancing spirit in abalone on the bow of the boat.

Behind the tomol crew is a drawing of four tomol paddlers. This is a partial translation of a rock painting from Cuyama. Just ahead of the tomol is the swordfish or 'elye'wun. Khus combined elements from many different rock paintings to create the 'elye'wun. The bill of the swordfish touches the navy-blue spirit Wot. She carries a staff to signify her position as a leader, and she also carries a child in her womb. The Spirit Wot was translated from a rock painting in Cuyama. The lighter blue spirit next to her is the moon spirit with a headdress of a crescent moon. She is also pregnant with a child. The moon spirit was translated from a Canaliño rock painting.

The green spirit next to the moon spirit is the spirit Liz-






ard Wot. According to several Ventureño rock paintings, it is said that were it not for Lizard the hands of humans would be shaped like a coyote paw instead of the five fingers similar to those of Lizard.

The orange spirit is the Grandfather spirit who carries a staff of hawk's feathers and healing medicine. The red spirit is the artist spirit who plays a flute which creates the sky. The music opens the Milky Way and the stars as the song floats from one horizon to the next. The yellow Sun spirit sits on top of the other spirits. Her headdress represents the rays of the sun and the path of the sun throughout the seasons. Like the spirit Wot and Moon spirit, she carries a child in her womb. The mural also shows the sun, moon, and the Milky Way.

The mural is a colorful addition to the East Village of Cambria that serves to remind visitors of the Chumash tribe. The mural is located on the front of the post office at 4100 Bridge Street in Cambria.




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he city of Atascadero, originally founded by E.G. Lewis in the early 1900s as a utopian community, is a popular location for shopping, dining and strolls along the lake shore. Home to the Charles Paddock Zoo, the town has a large selection of restaurants offering a range of cuisine from rib-sticking American style to Asian, Mediterranean and more. Breweries, wine tasting, bakeries, antique stores, specialty shops, boutiques and art galleries are tucked away in locations along the main El Camino Real and on side streets around the Sunken Gardens. Popular area wineries are only a short drive from downtown and any of the town's several hotels.

### **Attractions**

#### **Atascadero Lake Park**

A 1.3-mile easy walk path circles the lake in the park providing views of the lake, the many varieties of birds that frequent the lake and other visiting wildlife. Bring binoculars; more than 48 species of birds have been sighted at the lake and recorded on ebirds.org. Leashed dogs are allowed and the path is also a favorite place for cyclists. The

park has restrooms, small barbecue and recreation areas. The Faces of Freedom Veterans Memorial occupies the edge of the park facing Morro Road and is well worth a visit. The park is located at 9305 Pismo Ave, Atascadero just off of Morro Road (Highway 41).

#### **Charles Paddock Zoo**

The zoo is one of only 211 zoos accredited by the American Zoo and Aguarium Association, this zoo was founded in 1955 by Charles Paddock, a county park ranger who nursed injured wild animals back to health. Today, the zoo covers more than five acres. Many of the zoo residents are part of a world-wide program to preserve animals and their habitats. Some of these rare and endangered animals include the American Alligator and endangered owls and the Greater Roadrunner native to California. The zoo is located at 9100 Morro Rd, Atascadero. #### **Historic City Hall**

Atascadero's historic city hall is probably the city's best known historic building. Located at 6500 Palma Ave. and gracing the back of the Sunken Gardens, the doubledomed Italian Renaissance building was originally constructed in 1914 as the Atascadero Administration Building. After founder E.G. Lewis declared bankruptcy the building was purchased in 1927 and, over the years, served as three different private schools and a bank. It became the Veterans Memorial Building when acquired by the County of San Luis Obispo in 1954, and served as a community building. When the City of Atascadero incorporated in 1979, government offices occupied the building until it suffered major damage in the 2003 San Simeon Earthquake. After years of reconstruction and restoration, Historic City Hall opened again in 2013.





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

Santa Margarita is a taste of the old west. This settlement, easily reached from Highway 101 or Highway 58 is the gateway to Santa Margarita Lake and the Carrizo Plain National Monument. The small town quickly changes from the first impression of a sleepy western town to reveal surprising shops full of antiques, quirky garden art, plants, garden supplies, creative décor, restaurants serving up wholesome meals, and winery tasting rooms. The long history of Santa Margarita, from the ancestors of today's Chumash and Salinas people through the Spanish and Mexican land grants and early American settlers until today, is being researched and preserved by the Santa Margarita Historical Society.

empleton is the epitome of small town charm. Originally founded in 1886 as the last station on the southbound Southern Pacific Railroad, the town hosted horse drawn stagecoaches that met the trains and gave passengers a ride to San Luis Obispo to connect with the next stagecoach to their destinations. Even after the railroad extended the rails south to Santa Margarita in 1889, Templeton remained the shipping point for local crops and products bound eastward and to boats in shipping ports on the coast. Grain, wood, charcoal, fruit and cattle, driven from as far away as Kern County, arrived in Templeton for the next destination.

Many of the buildings from the late 1800s are still lining Main Street and housing unique shops, wineries and restaurants serving everything from hearty country breakfasts to dinner for every taste and the Templeton Historical Museum Society.







## Redwings Horse Sanctuary, a home for gentle giants

Horses, ponies, and donkeys find a safe haven

Redwings is home to all kinds of horses and burros from the smallest miniature horses to the largest draft horses. Visitors can see a herd of burros, mustangs from Montana's Pryor Mountains, or the regal thoroughbred horses watching over the ranch from their hilltop. The horses and burros in the care of Redwings include permanent residents who, due to age, illness, or injury are not adoptable and will live out their lives at the sanctuary.

Others are available for adoption as companions or for adoption for riding.

## The need for sanctuary

There are many, reasons that horses need a place in sanctuary and most of those reasons come down to the reality that horses are much harder to place than dogs and cats. What happens to larger animals desperately needing a secure place to live, due to abuse, neglect, or abandonment? The amount of space a horse needs, the cost involved in feed and care, and often the special handling and attention are not always easy to find.

The adoption program ensures that horses go to approved and loving homes. Those interested in adopting first fill out an adoption application and have a home inspection before being approved to adopt. During the first year of adoption, Redwings staff keep a close eye on the adopted horse and make sure they are happy, healthy, and a good fit for the new family.

## Over 40 years of service to horses

Redwings Horse Sanctuary was founded in Carmel, CA in 1991 with the mission to end the abuse, neglect, and slaughter of horses, ponies, donkeys, mules, and burros. Redwings rescued 15 equines that first year. Since then, it has rescued, rehabilitated, and provided permanent sanctuary and adoptive homes to hundreds of horses and donkeys.

Thanks to a generous trust bequest, Redwings was able to purchase a 141-acre property on Union Road in Paso Robles in 2015. A grand opening in September 2021 officially opened the gates to the new, permanent sanctuary for abused, abandoned, and neglected equines. The property was designed specifically to meet the needs of the rescued horses.


## An accredited nonprofit

The mission of Redwings Horse Sanctuary is to eliminate the causes of equine suffering through education and community outreach programs, to rescue abused and neglected equines, and to provide permanent sanctuary or selected adoptive homes for those equines. The new permanent location allows for increased educational outreach to local schools and the potential to build a future horse therapy program.

Redwings Horse Sanctuary is an accredited 501(c) 3 non-profit horse rescue organization. Over the years since it was founded, Redwings has received accreditation from CARMA (California Race Management Account), TAA (Thoroughbred Aftercare Alliance) and GFAS (Global Federation of Animal Sanctuaries). The CARMA and TAA accreditation designate Redwings as an approved aftercare facility for retired racehorses. The GFAS is an international organization that provides certification for animal sanctuaries through verification and accreditation.

Redwings offers guided public tours, community volunteer opportunities with the horses, horse sponsorships, and a vibrant adoption program. Be sure to check the website for various events that are scheduled throughout the year.

## Savor the flavor, taste local premium olive oils

Olive oil tasting involves smelling the aroma of an oil, and then sipping it to taste its positive attributes. Official tasters drink the oil from dark blue glasses, to ensure they can't see the color of the olive oil (and be influenced by an oil's green or gold color).

## Look for three qualities

Tasters should look for these three positive attributes:

**Fruitiness:** Any positive organic smell or taste.

**Bitterness:** A sign of freshness that is usually tasted on the sides of the tongue.

**Pungency:** A peppery, burning sensation in the throat.

Not all olive oils have all three of the attributes, but some should be present. Try it for yourself!! Grab that bottle you've had in the pantry for ages, and taste it to see if it's still good. Pour some into a wine glass—about an inch or two high—cover the glass with one hand while warming the base of the glass with the other. Place your nose into the glass after a minute and breathe in. Does it smell fruity, like green apples, cut grass, or tomato leaf? Great! Or does it smell unpleasant, like paint thinner, bacon, or a musty cellar? In that case, it's probably defective and should be thrown out.

Next, slurp in about a quarter of a teaspoon and let it sit on your tongue while you breathe in. Finally, swallow a bit and look for any signs of pepper in the throat. If an oil has a greasy feeling on your tongue, it's probably past its prime.

Remember, olive oil is a fresh product, much like a fruit juice. It needs to be used within 24 months of when it's made, and it needs to be used within a few months of opening the bottle.



Miller points to their "amazing team" as being essential to the success of Sunshine Olive Oil. Together, they work to produce extra virgin olive oil (EVOO) bursting with polyphenols and antioxidants.

"Richard and Linda not only helped us plant the first trees, they are the force behind the farming," she said. "Dominique Lobjois has been intrinsic in the evolution of our family-owned company, while Eileen Nunes and Corinne Ashley manage the day-to-day operations in our tasting room."

Alex MacMiller was hired to assist Richard and his crew of farmworkers with planting new trees and maintaining the groves. He also mills the olives at the estate mill while his wife, Michelle, manages the company's social media accounts.

Garnering medals this year in Paso Robles, New York, Japan, and Greece has inspired the family to keep moving forward and improving every aspect of their family-owned business. "We are expanding our production from 5,000 trees in San Luis Obispo County to over 20,000," Miller said. "As from the beginning, all will be planted, cared for, and picked by hand. We are continuing to focus on how to make the best olive oil, not only in California but worldwide."

## Gorgeous tasting room in downtown Paso Robles

When it comes to enjoying a unique tasting experience of fabulous and healthy olive oils, the ambiance of the Sunshine Olive Oil tasting room and home goods store in downtown Paso Robles is unsurpassed. Its welcoming setting includes a wow factor Miller describes as "eclectic and boujee" that somehow manages to maintain a large portion of its original Paso Robles history.

Featuring stamped ceilings, original 100-year-plus hardwood floors adorned with cowhides and tapestry rugs, and a tasting

bar made of English Pine topped with marble, the store definitely has what Miller refers to as "a little French Je ne sais quoi" mixed with an undeniable Western flair. Under the sparkle of crystal chandeliers lie beautiful treasures for the home and garden including tea towels and tablecloths from France and Denmark, olive wood products, jams, soaps, gift baskets, and more.

"Eileen and Corinne do an amazing job running the store," Miller said. "They can answer questions about all of our home goods, and love sharing our amazing olive oils with everyone. They provide a tasting experience that is educational and inspiring."

During tastings, they like to start visitors off with a lighter oil before moving on to one with a more heavy, spicy, pungent flavor. Many people like to taste vinegar as well, including some Balsamic and local, wine-based offerings.

## Healthy olive oils high in polyphenols

Topping the list of customer favorites is the Tuscan Blend. Made from a mix of frantoio, leccino, moraiolo, and pendolino olives, the oil is dark green and delicately balanced with a flavor profile of green olives, freshly cut grass, almond, artichoke, and black pepper.

"It's incredibly high in polyphenols, tastes amazing, and is super healthy," Miller said.

For those wanting a more delicate oil for everyday use, their 100% Leccino California EVOO is a favorite. With a flavor profile of sweet, freshly cut grass, almond, and pepper, it may be used for cooking, salad dressings, or even baking.

Their Miller Blend California EVOO, with flavors of green tea, nettle, and black pepper, is a musttry. It also comes with a fun history.

"When we planted the trees, we were novices and just planted different varieties," Miller said. "After harvest, we decided to do a field blend and, since we are the Millers, we called it the Miller Blend. Little



did we know this is a technical term from the past where, at the end of the day, an olive miller would use all of the leftover olives and call it the Miller Blend!"

Since then, the family has acquired two additional properties, and now have a total of 14 acres of trees including unusual varieties such as bosana from

Sardinia and hoiiblanca from Spain. They are passionate about environmentally-conscious farming, refrain from using toxic pesticides or fertilizers, practice beekeeping, and also grow lavender.

The Sunshine Olive Oil team invites everyone to stop by their tasting room, peruse their offerings of unique artwork and gifts, and sample some of their awardwinning oils.

"Please come by the store and experience our ray of sunshine to inspire your day," Miller said.

Academy-awardwinning film editor and family welcome visitors to their boutique winery

Prom the time they planted their Mystic Hills Vineyard, Joel and Judy Cox have consistently demonstrated a passion for providing unsurpassed experiences and awardwinning wines. By offering private, complimentary tastings at their vineyard and winery, the Cox family lends a personal touch to their interactions with each guest.

"We have so much love for people," Judy said. "We offer private

tastings by appointment only, which allows us to spend two or three hours with each person or group. This gives us the chance to get to know one another, share our story, and just enjoy being together."

Theirs is a true love story filled with tenacity, hard work, and family. Married for 56 years and counting, Joel and Judy encourage and support one another even when their careers sometimes take them miles apart. Their winery is a family-run operation with their children and grandchildren pitching in to help with the vineyard, oversee tastings, and manage the wine club.

Joel, an Academy Award-winning film editor who frequently works with Clint Eastwood, has edited numerous films including "Gran Torino", "Unforgiven", "Million Dollar Baby", "The Bridges of Maddison County", "Letters From Iwo Jima", and more. He fell in love with Bordeaux wines while traveling with Eastwood to the Cannes International Film Festival.

In 2004, Joel and Judy purchased their 14-acre hillside ranch in San Miguel and planted their boutique vineyard in 2007. Utilizing the same professional and creative love he holds for film, Joel consistently earns awards for each of their Mystic Hills wines.

## **Award-winning wines**

Winemaker and vintner Keith Roberts has been with Mystic Hills since the beginning, working the vineyard and creating hand-crafted, estate-grown Bordeaux-style wines with Joel. Their teamwork has led to the winery being named the Monterey County Winery of the Year and San Luis Obispo County Winery of the Year.

"Joel puts the same integrity and hard work into everything that he does," Judy said. "When he sets out to do something, he does it right. And, Keith is such a wonderful, knowledgeable guy. He has so much experience, and he has the same ideas as we do, so it's just an ideal partnership."

The climate at the winery, which is part of the Pleasant Valley Wine Trail, typically consists of crisp mornings, hot days, and cool afternoon winds. These temperature swings and the way the team works the land contribute to the growth of superior fruit for Mystic Hills wines.

"We don't fertilize, we don't spray our vines, and this ensures pure, beautiful wine," Judy said.

Making beautiful wines with consistent balance and character takes time. After the grapes are harvested by hand and separated, they are placed in neutral oak barrels and aged 18 months before blending, then left alone for another year. Once bottled, it's another six months before the wines are released.

Not long after releasing their first Mystic Hills bottles in 2011, they started racking up awards including gold at the 2015 San Francisco Chronicle Wine Competition for their 2011 Unforgiven wine. Aptly named after Joel's Oscar-winning film with Eastwood, this rich, velvety blend of cabernet sauvignon, cabernet franc, merlot, petit verdot, and malbec remains a favorite among customers.

In addition, Mystic Hills has consistently earned awards from such prestigious events as the New York International Wine Competition, the Critics Challenge International Wine Competition, the Los Angeles International Wine Competition, and more. Their 2017 Reserve Unforgiven is bottled in pristine quality glass and available in limited quantities. Each bottle is hand-signed, and decorated



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with a medallion designed by the couple and placed onto each bottle by Joel.

Their Gran Trio blend includes cabernet sauvignon, cabernet franc, and merlot. The name for their h.e.a.r.t.s. rosé was coined using the first initials of their grandchildren's names – Heather, Emma, Alexander, Rachel, Tyler, and Savannah. Joel and Judy call it a "rosé for red wine drinkers" with rich, fruity flavors. Offerings of other varieties, such as their "Joyride" merlot, are produced in limited quantities, and most feature labels that are created by their son, David.

The Cox Family unveiled their 2020 wines at their fall gathering and pick-up party in early November 2024. With aromas and tastes of cherry, dried strawberry, caramel, cocoa, and hints of vanilla, the fruit from 2020 has been transformed into a stunning lineup of wines.

## Tasting room, wine club, and movie nights

At the Mystic Hills tasting room, it's all about providing a warm welcome and exceptional hospitality to everyone who visits with the Cox

family. Their home has a spacious covered patio with gorgeous views of the vineyards and surrounding hills. The landscaping includes several sitting areas and an outdoor kitchen. Son-in-law, Chris, likes to fire up the pizza oven, while Judy and daughter Becky frequently prepare charcuterie boards for guests.

"We want to get to know people

and share our love of family and wine with them," Judy said. "Everyone enjoys sitting outdoors, but when it's cold, we just go inside. We're not fancy people; we greet everyone when they arrive, and welcome them like one of the family."






## Discovering Chronic Cellars' artful wines and quirky labels

A beautiful winding drive along Nacimiento Lake Drive in the Adelaida District of Paso Robles's wine country leads to the Chronic Cellars tasting room. Situated on a corner lot with a large green area and a pet-friendly patio, the tasting room offers a laid-back experience. Inside the tasting room, guests get a sense of the winery's adventurous vibe with a large colorful mural and artwork on the walls. The tasting it-

self is all about the wine and guests may elevate their tasting by preordering a cheese pairing. Group size is limited to six people to keep the experience wine-focused.

The legend of Chronic Cellars dates to 2004 when the founders, Josh and Jake Beckett, combined their winemaking skills with their wit and humor to turn an idea into reality using two tons of the best – or 'chronic' – grapes to make stellar wine. Since then, each wine has been given a witty name and a colorful, quirky label.

Don't let the fun décor and labels fool you, Chronic Cellars is fully committed to making seriously good wine. Winemaker, Kip Lorenzetti, works with premium growers in the Paso Robles area to select the right grapes he wants for crafting custom blends. The high-quality wines consistently receive 90+ point accolades.

The wine portfolio includes a large selection of wine – predominantly custom red blends with a character on the label to represent the wine. For example, Mr. Nibbles is a blend of zinfandel, petite sirah and syrah featuring a long-eared rabbit claimed to "have something

up his sleeve and a good time on his mind." Knight Mare is a blend of cabernet sauvignon and syrah sporting a label with the skeleton of a knight on a horse wielding a large sword, for a wine that is meant to "bewitch your senses and leave you wondering if it was just a dream."

The characters on the labels, coupled with the stellar wine, have captured people's attention and built a following over the years. Once people discover the wines, they keep coming back for more. Angela White, DTC operations manager, highly recommends joining the wine club. "Our wine club, Chronic Connoisseurs Club, offers great perks. With just two sixbottle shipments of red wine a year, members receive a 25% discount on all wine and logo merchandise purchases. Other perks include access to exclusive wines, member-only pick-up parties, and an unlimited number of complimentary tastings throughout the year with up to four guests included each visit."

Although the wine club offers all red wines, you will find some whites and rosé on the wine list. A fun way to start is with a little Spritz & Giggles, Chronic's chardonnay-



based sparkling wine. For those who enjoy lighter wines, the Crown Jules, Stone Fox, Kindly Swallows, and Pink Pedals are some of the alternatives to the red wine offerings.

## Explore the sustainable, eco-friendly charm of Shale Oak Winery

Discover Shale Oak Winery's innovative practices and a unique approach to wine

n an unassuming road just off Highway 46 lies Shale Oak Winery. With its multicolored stained-glass windows and slanted roof, it looks like a church. However, instead of serving up sermons, they serve up high-quality wine in their SIP-certified tasting room.

At Shale Oak Winery, they've taken sustainability in practice a step further by designing their entire facility to be Gold LEED Certified. LEED stands for leader-

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ship, energy, and environmental design. According to LEED, "The LEED plaque on a building is a mark of quality and achievement in green building."

Owner Al Good dreamed of a vineyard, winery, and tasting room with very little impact on the environment. His dream became a reality. Everyone at Shale Oak is committed to the vision of sustainability. Lead Winemaker, Curtis Hascall, has been with the winery from the beginning and is equally committed to Good's vision. "From the beginning, one of our goals was to get that Gold Certification; so, we worked with Studio 2G Architecture down in San Luis Obispo. They helped guide us in that direction. We opened the production facility and did our first harvest in 2010, and then the tasting room opened in 2011."


Despite the beautiful stained glass, the tasting room was not designed to look like a church but instead to reclaim water. Both the tasting room and production facility have pitched roofs so rainwater will go down the slope of the roof. It then passes through drip chains and is filtered through the rocks.

It then goes to the reclamation pond/water feature just outside the tasting room. The pond then flows into a pipe that flows directly to the catch basin that pumps the water to 5 hundred-thousand-gallon tanks. The roofs are pitched so perfectly that water beads up during a heavy fog, and, of course, that is also collected.

"My favorite part is the water collection because that's such a big issue around here, and to capture all that clean water is beneficial for our vineyards and our landscape. It's cleaner water than the well water around here. It's not the cheapest thing to set up. It's not economically the best, but it's important."

What else makes the buildings and property so special? The whole property is set up so all rainwater will flow in the direction of the catch basin. The wood you see as you walk up to the front door is reclaimed wood from a train trestle from Vandenberg Space Force Base. The counters are recycled crushed glass. The cabinets are bamboo. The bathrooms smell like sulfur because they use reclaimed groundwater. The buildings are all solar, and they're smart. Many of the windows have motors on them, and if the temperature outside drops below the temperature inside they automatically open and fans pull the cool air inside. The building also senses when someone has left, and automatically turns the heater off. The fireplace burns denatured alcohol which only emits water vapor. Their motto is "sustainability to the forefront," and it's evident throughout the property.

The same attention to detail they put in the buildings has gone into the winemaking. According to Hascall, "Our varietals are the best of Paso. We have Rhône's. We have Bordeaux. We have Zinfandel. We have a good mix of everything that I feel grows well in the area. Everything is from Paso Robles. Everything is done in small lots. Nothing is more than a couple hun-



dred cases produced. So, we're able to pay a lot of attention to detail and focus on the wine quality."

They have many Best-in-Class awards, but Hascall's favorite is Sunset Magazine's Double Gold, Best in Class award for their 2019 Syrah which is the perfect embodiment of a westside Paso Robles Syrah.

There's nothing pretentious at Shale Oak Winery. The vibe is cool and funky and both family and dogfriendly. Hascall states, "We want people to relax and enjoy the wine because that's what it's all about. Enjoying the wine."

Shale Oak Winery is located just off Highway 46 at 3235 Oakdale Road, Paso Robles. The tasting room is open from 10:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m. Thursday-Monday.. For reservations or more information visit shaleoakwinery.com or call (805) 239-4800


