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


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ABOUT DIABLO CANYON POWER PLANT



Welcome to San Luis Obispo County. We are glad you have chosen to visit. A fixture within our community is the Diablo Canyon Power Plant (DCPP). DCPP is a nuclear power plant that generates approximately 10% of California's electricity. Both PG&E and the County of San Luis Obispo have developed detailed emergency plans that would be used in the unlikely event that an emergency were to occur at DCPP.

If a serious emergency were to occur that would require you to take action, the County would sound the Early Warning System sirens. The sirens are an indication to tune to a local radio or television station for emergency information and instructions. When at sea, tune to Marine Channel 16.

The siren system is tested regularly throughout the year and may be used for any local emergency.

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There are many things to discover around SLO

The city of San Luis Obispo has much to see and do. It is the seat of county government, a popular dining and shopping destination and a traditional college town reflecting eclectic choices in art, entertainment, food and activities.

Attractions

The San Luis Obispo de Tolosa Mission

The San Luis Obispo de Tolosa mission is one of the best known historical sites in town. Founded by Father Junipero Serra in September 1772, the mission was the fifth of the California missions and named after Saint Louis, Bishop of Toulouse, France. For information about tours and the gardens or attending mass visit missionsanluisobispo.org.

Historical buildings

Other historical buildings, many featuring unique architecture, include the Sinsheimer store with an iron front built in 1884 at 849 Monterey St., the Jack House at 536 Marsh Street, which was built in 1875, the State Historical Landmark Dallidet Adobe at 1185 Pacific St and the 1884 Ah Louis Store at 800 Palm St, originally a supply station for the Chinese laborers who built the railroad tunnels through the mountains of the Cuesta Grade.

The Madonna Inn, known worldwide for its elegant and quirky décor, has been a stop for visitors since first built in 1958. The inn, restaurant and over 100 rooms occupy 1000 acres of scenic Central Coast land.

The historic Carnegie Library on Monterey Street is home to the History Center of San Luis Obispo. Built in 1905, the library is one in a chain of over 1600 libraries funded by the United States by Scottish-American businessman and philanthropist Andrew Carnegie. The SLO Carnegie Museum is one of three still standing and in use on the Central Coast. The other two are located in Lompoc and Paso Robles.

San Luis Obispo Botanical Gardens

Gardeners and outdoor enthusiasts are not left out. The San Luis Obispo Botanical gardens, on Highway 1 near Dairy Creek Road is the only garden in the United States exclusively featuring plants and ecosystems from the five Mediterranean climates in the world. The design includes miles of paved trails and shady resting spots and a variety of other activities.

Hiking and cycling

The city's Parks and Recreation Department operates several parks that span 7000 acres of breathtaking views and hiking trails. Visit the website for the City of San Luis Obispo for park maps details about the ease or difficulty of the trails.

The city has over 75 miles of bike paths and what better way for cycling enthusiasts to enjoy a vacation. San Luis Obispo was designated a Bicycle Friendly Community by the League of American Bicyclists in 2007. 

Longevity is typically a rare and hard-won battle in the restaurant industry, and one of those precious few is Louisa's Place, a classic fifties-style diner and a San Luis Obispo favorite since it opened in 1958 as the Best Ever Grill. The diner was purchased in 1976 by Louise Webb, and became an instant success as Louisa's. The Sweeney family, kept the name when they purchased the business from Webb. The current owner, Aubrey Pyle took over from the Sweeney family in 2019.

Louisa's has won as the "New Times" Best Breakfast in SLO County over fifteen times, and the "Mustang News" Cal Poly students best breakfast four years in a row. The eatery regularly received outstanding Yelp reviews, and has Trip Advisor's Award of Excellence.

There are 26 omelets on the menu along with the build-your-own option. There are also pancakes, local sausage, bacon, oatmeal, breakfast burritos, huevos rancheros, and waffles. 



challenging to a dog or a person not in good physical shape.



There are three different access points to the Islay Hill Trail, ending at a 776-foot panoramic view of Edna Valley and the Santa Lucia Mountains from this peak in the Seven Sisters formation. Trailheads are from Sweet Bay Lane, Spanish Oaks Drive, or Huckleberry Lane.

Johnson Ranch Open Space

The Johnson Ranch Loop is a two-segment trail. The 2.6-mile segment is recommended for cycling and the 2.3-mile segment for hiking. The Filipponi Connector leads hikers to trails in the Irish Hills Nature Reserve. The trailhead is just off Highway 101 between San Luis Obispo and Pismo Beach.

Laguna Lake Natural Reserve

Four intersecting trails bring hikers and cyclists to Laguna Lake. Two trails, the Allen K. Settle Trail and the Lakeside Trail are ranked as easy. Laguna Lake Upper Loop Trail is an intermediate trail. Laguna Lake Ridge Trail is expert only. The entrance is at 504 Madonna Road in San Luis Obispo.

Reservoir Canyon Open Space

Reservoir Canyon Trail is a 5.35-mile round-trip moderate to difficult hike through oak and eucalyptus groves, featuring waterways, a waterfall and a 360-degree view from the top. Leashed dogs are welcome. Mountain bikes are prohibited.

Stenner Springs Natural Reserve

Stenner Springs Natural Reserve trail system has seven different trails that total a little over 20 miles with varying levels of difficulty. The shortest trail, the Stenner Creek Trail to Elevator Trails is a 2.9-mile moderately challenging loop. The



longest trail complex, which includes the Morning Glory, Botanical and Shooters Loop for hikers and mountain bikes is a challenging 9.3-mile loop that takes over four hours to complete.

Bob Jones Trail

This is a 5-mile family-friendly paved loop connecting San Luis Obispo and Avila Beach. Start at Ontario Road and walk or bike along the San Luis Obispo Creek, through the Avila Golf Course, enjoying shade from sprawling oaks along the way.

Unwind on a unique winetasting adventure

The San Luis Obispo region includes the Edna Valley and Arroyo Grande AVAs, two of California's leading AVAs. Edna Valley was the first AVA granted in San Luis Obispo County in 1982 and has been producing wine since 1968. The two AVAs first attracted attention in the early 1980s when the California branch of the Champagne house Deutz, acquired land in the area. Sparkling wine is still made in the area.



The gentle sunshine and moderate Pacific Ocean maritime climate combine with the fertile soil to produce incredible wines. Bring a camera and plan on a day of adventure sipping great wine, sampling some apple brandy, having lunch, and playing some bocce ball.

Stephen Ross Cellars, from a Minnesota basement to worldclass pinot noir

Stephen Ross Dooley's curiosity about wine started as a teen making rhubarb and apple wine in his family's Minnesota basement, and after a degree at UC Davis and 17 years of making wine for others, he launched Stephen Ross Wine Cellars with his wife, Paula, in 1994. In the years leading up to his own winery, Stephen worked as a winemaker in Napa Valley, Edna Valley, South Africa, and Australia.

Stephen Ross Cellars produces five or six single vineyard pinot noirs plus other varietals that flourish in the coastal climate including a Blanc de Noir sparkling.

The couple owns the 10-acre Stone Corral Vineyard in Edna Valley, which they planted exclusively with pinot noir clones and rootstocks in 2001. The Stone Corral Pinot Noir is their top seller. Another favorite is the winery's 2021 Pinot Noir Arête. The Dooleys promote sustainable vineyard management and winemaking practices, only sourcing grapes from SIP-certified vineyards.

Stephen Ross Wine Cellars is located at 178 Suburban Rd., San Luis Obispo. Tasting room hours are Fri-Sun 11 a.m.-5 p.m. Reservations are recommended. For more information visit stephenrosswine.com or call (805) 594-1318.

Sip wine among the barrels at Claiborne and Churchill Winery

Claiborne & Churchill Winery, still run by original owners Claiborne and Fredericka Churchill Thompson, has been producing Alsatian-style whites since 1983. In 1995, the couple built their pioneering, eco-friendly straw baleconstructed winery and opened their tasting room in the Edna



Valley. Over the years they have expanded their picturesque garden area to accommodate more guests and larger parties for tastings and seasonal events.

The upscale welcoming tasting room is located in the barrel room, allowing the popular producer to accommodate more visitors comfortably. Reservations are available for small private events such as birthdays, anniversaries, and graduation parties.

Centrally located in SLO Wine Country, Claiborne & Churchill's vacation property is only a tenminute drive from Pismo Beach, San Luis Obispo, or Arroyo Grande, and a fifteen-minute drive to Cal Poly. Their guest cottage is perfect for a weekend, for visiting students at Cal Poly, or for anyone just looking for a relaxing getaway. Autry Cellars' unpretentious tasting room is, "styled in early American warehouse," jokes Autry. But, don't be deceived by the modest décor. Here is where visitors experience superb wine varietals along with gold medal best-in-class grappa and silver medal American oak and Hungarian oak brandies.

Inspired by a spectacular zinfandel tasting experience Autry became a full-time artisan winemaker in 2001 and a fully licensed brandy distiller in 2012. He says people who visit his tasting room, "come for the wine and discover the brandy," and gain access to impressive small lot wines and brandies that are available exclusively in the tasting room.





ake a drive away from the beaten paths of Hwy. 101 and Hwy. 1 and discover the quiet paradise of Avila Beach. Today, the pier is occupied by commercial fishing and restaurants and is open to pier-fishing. Avila Beach Pier was built in 1908 and was important for fishing and oceanbound passenger transportation. It has been partially closed to foot traffic since 2015 due to storm damage. Fishing

Personal boats and kayaks can be launched from Olde Port Beach, a public hoist at Harford Pier and two additional hoists are made accessible to the public by the Port San Luis Harbor District. To arrange use of either the trailer boat launch for boats up to 28' feet, or the mobile hoist for larger boats call the harbor district at (805) 595-7895.

Hiking

The Bob Jones Trail starts at the trailhead on Ontario Road and wanders along the San Luis Obispo Creek. The paved trail, about three miles from trailhead to downtown Avila Beach, is a mostly smooth hike or bike ride with benches along the way.

Attractions

Dinosaur Caves Park

Located at the corner of Cliff Street and Shell Beach Road, this 11-acre park is popular with walkers, photographers, dog lovers, joggers and fishing enthusiasts. Observe dolphins, whales, sea otters and other sea life as well as sea and shore birds such as gulls, cormorants, and Peregrine falcons. Reservations may be required for group events. Oceano Dunes

Thousands flock to the Oceano Dunes State Recreational Park to camp along the ocean in tents and RVs every week. You can rent and ride dune buggies and ATVs on the beach and enjoy riding for the entire afternoon. There is a small cost per vehicle to drive on the beach and it is recommended you have a larger vehicle before attempting to drive on the dry sand; you don't want to get stuck in the dunes.

Ocean views

Pismo Beach is home to several parks with beautiful, panoramic views of the Pacific Ocean and birds and marine life that live and migrate through the Central Coast. A few of the most popular parks with exquisite views, trails, places to rest, picnic and enjoy the scenery include:

Chumash Park covers 38-acres of

wetlands, willows, oaks and is home to a rich variety of birds and wildlife. Bring a camera. Leashed dogs are welcome.

• Eldwayen Ocean Park meanders over a mile along the bluffs and has stairs down to the beach and the tidepools. Check a tide chart to visit during low tide to explore the tidepools.

• Margo Dodd Park, located on a bluff above the ocean includes breathtaking panoramas of the ocean, beaches and surrounding areas. Bring binoculars and a camera. Walk the sandy beach to a tidepool at the end of Pier Street.

Hiking and scenic walks at the Pismo Preserve

The preserve provides over 11 miles of trails wandering through 880-acres of oak woodlands and coastal ridges and some of the most stunning panoramic views of the Pacific Ocean and surrounding land and beaches. Trails are marked for the direction of travel. Park is open weekdays from sunup to sunset.

Price Historical Park





The oak tree studded open space offers hiking and equestrian trails and is home to more than 175 species of flowering plants, more than 150 species of birds and all of the wildlife that calls the region home. Quagga mussel inspections are in force. Call (805) 781-5930 for more information about Quagga mussel inspections, camping, boat launching and horse trailer parking.

Exploring nature near Arroyo Grande

Vacations are always better with some adventure and exploring and there's no better way than experiencing nature. The Arroyo Grande countryside is some of the most beautiful in the region, and there are miles of hiking, biking, and equestrian trails less than 20 minutes from Arroyo Grande Village.

Lopez Lake Recreation Area is a short drive from the village and the trailheads are easily accessible from campgrounds or designated parking. Nearly 20 leashed dogfriendly trails, varying from easy to challenging, offer spectacular scenery and wildlife sightings for the entire family.

Every trail offers memorable nature experiences from strolls through meadows and the shade of oaks to brilliant and exotic wildflowers on view in the springtime. Native California grasses and plants are a delight, including fragrant salvia and artemisia shrubs. Watch for the poison oak!

Wildlife includes more than 150 species of birds, including wild turkeys, eagles, hawks, condors, deer, sightings of coyotes, foxes, rabbits, and other small mammals, lizards, and snakes, including rattlesnakes!

Bring your cell phone, camera, and binoculars. Climbing a trail and cresting a hill might offer views of the lake or panoramas of foothills and meadows. Each trail is an adventure and there are some easy walks near the lake.



R oosters, history, museums, great food, festivals, and fun are all waiting in Arroyo Grande, known as the Village to locals. This charming village is filled with oneof-a-kind shops offering antique and vintage items, collectibles, clothing, sporting goods, gifts, and more.

Pizza, a swinging bridge, history, and the farmers' market

Hungry after shopping? Stop in for a little piece of Alaska at Klondike Pizza. Specialty pizzas are on the menu and locals say the place is haunted.

As you walk around the village don't miss the Swinging Bridge, the only one of its kind in California. The bridge is 171 feet long and swings 40 feet above the stream. Originally the bridge had no sides, but they were added in 1902. The bridge was donated to the city in 1911, destroyed by a storm in 1995, but since reconstructed.

Visit historic buildings dating from the late 1800s and early 1900s in Heritage Park and catch a concert, too!

Centennial Park hosts the Saturday farmers' market and is home to a troupe of free-ranging roosters and hens. Their population fluctuates from time to time, but on a good day, they can be seen foraging and clucking around the park.

Concerts and festivals

Arroyo Grande is where families can enjoy concerts and festivals all year.

From the holidays through spring, summer, and the fall harvest, festivals offer activities, parades, vendors, and lots of tasty food and beverages.

Upcoming events include: • Free summer concerts are held at the Rotary Bandstand in Heritage Square Park every Sunday through September 22 from 1-3 p.m. Bring your picnic baskets, lawn chairs, and blankets.

• The Harvest Festival, a tribute to agriculture, is held the last weekend in September. The featured attractions include a parade, live entertainment, agricultural exhibits, and an array of food, games, and arts and crafts booths.

Parks and open spaces

The many parks include one of the few off-leash dog parks within miles along with some unique experiences:

• Fire Resistive Landscaping Demonstration Garden located at the corner of Traffic and Station Way demonstrates how wildfireresistant areas can also be beautiful gardens.

• Health Fitness Park at 834 Fair Oaks Avenue, has jogging trails, exercise stations, and a heart check station.

• The James Way Oak Habitat on James Way is a 73-acre oak preserve with equestrian, walking, and jogging trails winding along a hillside through majestic oaks and sightings of wildlife. The area is open from 7 a.m. to sunset.

Nipomo

Nipomo is a small town on the mesa in the southern area of San Luis Obispo County that is known for its stands of eucalyptus trees, expansive golf courses and special outdoor and nature experiences.

Nipomo preserves a spirit of true frontier land even while modern businesses thrive in its commercial areas. Standing on the wet sand of the shore of the Pacific, looking out over the sprawling Guadalupe-Nipomo Dunes toward the rich, riparian woods, creeks, fresh water lakes and the Santa Maria River, one imagines seeing the same views that the original Chumash saw while going about their daily activities. The word "nipomo" means "base of the hills" in the Chumash language.

Bostonian sea captain, Captain William G. Dana acquired a land grant in 1837, and settled the 37,888-acre Rancho Nipomo. His adobe house still stands near the 101 Freeway.

Attractions Guadalupe-Nipomo Dunes

The 3,400-acre Guadalupe-Nipomo Dunes Preserve is one of the largest remaining coastal dune systems in the nation and is a mustsee excursion for hikers, naturalists and bird-watchers. Catch glimpses of more than 200 varieties of birds and view more than 120 imperiled plants and animals within the preserve's National Wildlife Refuge and surrounding dune habitat.

Nipomo Native Gardens

A forest of native plants and trees are maintained by volunteers from the Nipomo Native Gardens Society. The Nipomo Native Garden is a 12-acre site located between Pomeroy, Camino Caballo and Osage, nipomonativegarden.org.

Nipomo Swap Meet

The huge Nipomo Swap Meet and Flea market is on the grounds adjacent to the 101 Freeway at the Teft Street off-ramp. The Nipomo Swap Meet & Flea market combines great family entertainment with old school swap meet atmosphere. It is the largest swap meet on California's Central Coast and is open Sunday only 6 a.m. - 4 p.m. \$4 Parking. No dogs. Visit nipomoswapmeets.com or call (805) 929-7000 for more information.

Dana Adobe Historical Landmark and Cultural Center

The mission of the Dana Adobe Cultural Center is to engage visitors with the stories of California's Rancho Era History, connecting them with the peoples, the land and its resources to foster environmental stewardship and cultural understanding. os Osos, Spanish for "Valley of the Bears", is off the beaten path and the gateway to Montana de Oro, an amazing state park along the ocean. The town has many quaint places of interest for visitors to stop on their way to and from the state park. Try one of the many restaurants or grab something to take with you for a picnic at the beach or one of the nearby forests.

Montana de Oro

The park is well-used with daily visitors throughout the year who go there to hike, picnic, fish, camp, surf, take a dip in the ocean or visit the tide pools. The park's visitor center is located at Spooner's Ranch House Museum above Spooner's Cove. The park is free to enter. (805) 528-0513. For camping call (800) 444-7275.

Elfin Forest

The forest has nearly 200 species of plants, more than 100 varieties of birds, and many species of mammals and reptiles and amphibians. The forest includes a 1-mile boardwalk that is wheelchair accessible at the north end of 16th Street. Guided tours are given on the third Saturday of each month at 9:30 am starting at the north end of 15th Street off Santa Ysabel. (805) 528-0392.

Baywood Pier

The pier, at the intersection of 2nd Street and El Morro Ave., overlooks the shores of the back bay of Morro Bay. The Los Osos Oaks State Reserve Half-mile east of South Bay Boulevard on the south side of Los Osos Valley Road. The reserve has an easy one-mile trail through the "Pygmy Oaks", which are dwarfed coast live oaks. The low canopy reserve is on the site where Chumash once lived.

Los Osos Community Park

Located at the corner of Los Osos Valley Road and Palisades Avenue, the park includes a 17,000-square-foot skate park, three tennis courts, playgrounds and restrooms. The park is ideal for walking or picnicking and is the site of the Los Osos Valley School, one of five original one-room schoolhouses between San Luis Obispo and the coast. Of those five, only two still exist today, both in Los Osos.

Sweet Springs Nature Preserve

Located on the north end of Ramona Avenue between Broderon and 4th Street, the park is open from dawn to dusk and has trails that wander through the Monterey cypress and eucalyptus trees around two freshwater ponds and a salt marsh to the edge of Morro Bay.

Baywood Park Farmers' Market

On Santa Maria Avenue between 2nd and 3rd streets. The market takes place every Monday from 2-4:30 p.m. (805) 748-1109.

Bear statues

On your way into Los Osos notice the large grizzlies stationed as guards into the town at South Bay Boulevard and Los Osos Valley Road. The statues were created by local artist Paula Zima.

Sweet Springs Nature Reserve a birdwatching paradise

Adding a different experience to hiking, beach strolls, and family time

Sweet Springs Nature Preserve in Los Osos is one of the top birdwatching locations in SLO County. With 464 species of birds recorded in SLO County, birdwatching is the perfect outdoor activity for families and another reason for hiking and beach strolls. Individual birds number in the thousands, and at certain times of the year, include migrating birds not normally seen in the area. The Central Coast is one of the four main migration routes for birds in the Americas.

Birds that can be seen at Sweet Springs Nature Preserve include a rich variety of water birds and shore birds, bald eagles, ospreys, hawks, hummingbirds, woodpeckers, and many bird species some of us may have never seen before.

Spring and summer are nesting seasons when birders look forward to returning birds that have been gone all winter. Along with Central Coast birds that don't migrate, nesting season is an excellent opportunity to watch and learn. Species you

might see during nesting season include the hooded oriole, Bullock's oriole, black-headed grosbeak, cliff swallow, tree swallow, and Allen's hummingbird.

According to Susie Reddy, outreach coordinator for the Morro Coast Audubon Society (MCAS) and the Morro Bay Bird Festival, SLO County has some excellent locations for bird watching. Pack up the kids, binoculars, cameras, a picnic, and head out!

Birdwatching on the coast

For easy-to-reach locations in addition to the Sweet Springs Preserve, check out Oso Flaco Lake in Oceano. Favorite spots in Morro Bay are the marina boardwalk and Morro Rock. Farther north, visit Estero Bluffs State Park in Cayucos, the Harmony Headlands in San Simeon, and the Fiscalni Ranch Preserve near Cambria.

Birdwatching inland

For great inland locations, check out Meadow Park, El Chorro Park, or Laguna Lake in San Luis Obispo. The Bob Jones Trail at Avila Beach and Atascadero Lake in Atascadero are also easy to get to locations.

Getting to know the birds

Learning to identify each unique species can range from curiosity about what's in your backyard, to day trips, and vacations to observe many different birds in their natural habitats. "The easiest way to get started is to look out your windows," says Reddy. "You don't even need binoculars. You might be surprised at what you see and hear, birds are all around us!"

Joining a group is a family-fun way to learn and make new friends. The MCAS offers several monthly bird walks, beginner workshops, and in-depth learning classes.

The Sweet Springs Nature Preserve is located in Los Osos off Ramona Avenue and has been owned and managed by MCAS since 1989. The preserve offers hiking trails, beautiful views of Morro Bay and Morro Rock, and excellent birding opportunities. No pets please! Morro Bay A sightseer's delight

Explore the natural beauty of Morro Bay, a town famous for its fog and fishing. Whether for a day or a week, this small town by the Rock has something for everyone.

Morro Bay is bursting with exciting activities to try. There's deep sea fishing, whale watching, world-class surfing, hiking, biking, and kayaking.

When it comes to birdwatching, there's little doubt that Morro Bay provides the best chance for observing a great variety of species. It's an incredible birding spectacle. There are also harbor seals, sea lions, and sea otters.

Looking to take a slower pace? Stroll down the Embarcadero and browse gift shops and art galleries. Explore the local cuisine and dine on fresh caught fish. Sit on a bench in Tidelands Park and watch the boats leaving the harbor or take a walk on the beach and watch the waves. Walk out the harbor boardwalk to Morro Rock, the 576-foot volcanic plug that looms over the bay and seashore. Keep an eye out for sea otters that rest in the kelp beds near the shore.

Attractions

Morro Bay Maritime Museum

This museum has been preserving and interpreting the maritime history, especially that of California since 1995. The current fleet on exhibit includes the tug boat "Alma" that rescued sailors from the December 1941 Japanese attack on a Union Oil tanker off the coast of Morro Bay and the "Avalon," one of two Deep Submergence Rescue Vehicles (DSRV) submarines designed to rescue crews of downed submarines. The museum is located at 1210 Embarcadero in Morro Bay. For hours visit morrobaymaritime.org.

Morro Bay State Park

Morro Bay State Park, located at 60 State Park Rd. Morro Bay, features lagoon and bay habitat, all in view of Morro Rock. The park has opportunities for sailing, fishing, hiking and bird watching and features a marina and an 18-hole golf course. The Morro Bay Golf Course is located at 201 State Park Rd. Call (805) 772-1923 for hours and tee times.

The park is a California state park, visit parks.ca.gov for information about parking, hours and other attractions.

North Point Natural Area

Operated by the City of Morro Bay, the North Point Natural Area has a stairway that leads down to the beach. Once on the beach, people can walk north to Cayucos or south to Morro Rock. The beach has one of the best tidepool areas. In the spring, the meadow is full of blooming wildflowers. The entry is located on Toro Lane in Morro Bay.

Black Hill Trail

Located at Main St and Parkview Dr., this 2.5 mile trail is a moderate hike. The trail is a favorite spot for nature walks and birdwatching. Leashed dogs are welcome.

Giant chessboard at Centennial Parkway

According to the United States Chess Federation, the Giant Chessboard at Centennial Parkway, 806 Embarcadero, is only one of two outdoor chessboards in the United States. The other is located in New York City. The Morro Bay Chess Club installed chess tables and benches adjacent to the Giant Chessboard. The Giant Chessboard is available for reservations, Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., through the Morro Bay Recreation Services for a small fee. Visitors are always welcomed to join the Morro Bay Chess Club on Saturdays beginning at noon. For more information call (805) 772-6278

Art all year

Art Center Morro Bay presents eight exhibits annually with two spacious galleries and a classroom. Special juried exhibits have included the Pastel Society of the West Coast, featuring award-winning, national and international artists.

Sausage was in Don Sherwood's blood from the time he was 12. Raised locally, Sherwood is the last of nine children who had the opportunity to work for local ranchers, many of whom were of Italian/Swiss ancestry. "At one time of the year they would make Swiss sausage," he explained, "and I learned from that."

Sherwood eventually went into the meat industry and met a German man who desired to hand down his recipes for making sausage. He picked Don as his apprentice and even though he left the meat business for years, those recipes remained with him. When returning to the meat business he began to use those recipes but altered them to create his sausage specialty line.

Sausage is made with premium pork and fresh spices. After Juneé bugged Don for years he came up with a chicken sausage. The flavor wasn't quite what he wanted and one night after pondering it for hours he suddenly thought of the missing ingredient. It was cranberry. He did the same thing with Irish sausage finally hitting on Guinness Blonde Ale. It's his personal favorite.

Sausages offered are Coastal Italian, French Apple, Jalapeno Chipotle, Hot Basque, Baja, Bratwurst, and many more varieties. They also make two holiday sausages: Pumpkin Spice (Halloween) and Champagne Pecan (Christmas). All sausages are handmade in the store with no preservatives.

Sausage isn't everything there is also a deli with tasty sandwiches on fresh bread. Meats offered are turkey, ham, roast beef, pastrami, tri-tip, pork roast, salami, and Mary's chicken, a delicacy not matched by other chickens. Cheeses include provolone, Swiss, smoked cheddar, pepper Jack, Muenster, cheddar, and American. The charming village of Cambria is filled with unique shops, galleries, and restaurants serving all kinds of delicious food. The shops have everything from antiques, specialty items, household gadgets, exquisite jewelry, and art from the quirky to traditional. Walking through the village, along flower-filled yards and shady trees, the well-maintained buildings, many dating from the 1800s, all come together in a sense of how life in a more tranquil time must have been.

Cambria is also known as the gateway to Hearst Castle, glorious ocean scenery along Highway 1, and during the month of October, is the heart of the Cambria Scarecrow Festival. The festival is an outdoor display of whimsical handmade scarecrows that draws visitors from all over.

Attractions

Historical walking tour

Visit the Cambria Historical Society website (cambriahistoricalsociety.com) for a map of a walking tour of Cambria's historical buildings. The self-guided tour encompasses 28 buildings and the map includes a written history of each one. Learn the fascinating history of these old buildings and how their uses evolved from the original business or residence to their current occupations. Learn a little about the people and families who shaped Cambria's early years.

Visit the elephant seals

The elephant seal rookery extends six miles along the shoreline near Point Piedras Blancas in the Hearst San Simeon State Park. The seals may be seen all year but the largest populations are present during late January, April and October. Visit the Friends of the Elephant Seal website at elephantseal.org for information about the best viewing times and spots.

The Hearst San Simeon State Park

The state park encompasses the Moonstone Beach, the Santa Rosa Creek Natural Preserve, the San Simeon Natural Preserve and the Pa-Nu Cultural Preserve.

 Santa Rosa Creek Preserve includes valuable riparian forests and coastal wetlands, that provide habitat for endangered Tidewater Goby.

• San Simeon Natural Preserve covers vast wetlands, riparian areas, and several undisturbed native plant communities and is a wintering site for monarch butterflies.

• The 13.7 acre Pa-nu Cultural Preserve contains an archaeological site dated to 5850 years before the present era. The site holds significant evidence of prehistoric technology and life patterns.

A 3.3 mile trail runs through parts of the San Simeon Natural Preserve, with a portion of the trail being wheelchair accessible. The trail includes scenic overlooks, rest-stop benches and interpretive panels. The park address is 500 San Simeon Creek Road, Cambria. Call (805) 927-2010 for information about days and times the park is open.

Nitt Witt Ridge

This California Registered Historical Landmark #939 is famous for the artistic use of recycled materials used in its construction. Reclusive artist Arthur Harold Beal purchased the land in 1928 and spent the next 50 years creating his own version of a castle. Building materials include beer cans, concrete, washing machines, car parts, old stoves and abalone shells. Call (805) 927-2690 to arrange a tour.



Ride a gentle giant at Covell Clydesdale Ranch

Trails rides and tours travel past spectacular views

Take a trail ride through acres of Monterey pine forest, through pastures of grazing cattle, and along a spectacular ocean view. Covell Clydesdale Ranch in Cambria offers guided trail rides atop their 2000-pound gentle giants. Tara Covell says, "These are gentle and calm horses and easy to ride, you just have to be ablebodied and able to take instructions." Imagining sitting atop their broad backs can be daunting, but many say it's the experience of a lifetime.

"The rides are mostly walking," said Tara, "with some trotting and cantering depending on ability." Children must be at least seven years old. Helmets are not required but are provided if wanted. Bring your camera! Other fun includes UTV tours for groups of five or fewer or wagon tours for larger groups. The tours include the history of the ranch and up-close encounters with the pastured Clydesdales. Prior to Tara Covell's Clydesdale tourism business, her Father Covell had raised Clydesdales for nearly 40 years, 23 of those in Cambria before he passed in 2023. Originally based in Azu-

sa, California, he bred and showed his huge horses throughout the country. His search for more rural space brought his horses and family to a nearly 2000-acre ranch amongst the Monterey pine forest in Cambria. The

Inspiration to open the ranch to the public came about in 2015 when daughter, Tara, came up with the idea to offer the rides and tours for the public. Her business has carried the ranch for years, and is

continuing the legacy her Father dreamed of for decades!

Covell currently has between 50 and 60 Clydesdales, a breed of draft horse well known in the United States for representing Budweiser. The large, gentle Clydesdale is named for its origin

in the valley of the River Clyde in Lanarkshire, Scotland. The breed originated in the 18th century when imported Flemish stallions were bred to local mares. In the 19th century the Shire, another draft breed, was introduced to the bloodlines. Clydesdales were exported to other countries to help with farming. As mechanized farming began replacing the horse the Clydesdale's population diminished. Today the Clydesdale is bred primarily for show and is considered a vulnerable breed.

Clydesdales weigh between 1800 and 2000 pounds and measure around 18 hands. A hand equals four inches measured from the withers (top of the shoulder) to the bottom of the hoof. One of the horse's beautiful characteristics is the long silky hair, called feathers, covering the hooves and floating in the air as the horse moves. Another characteristic is the coat colors, ranging from tan, through reddish tan, dark brown to almost black. Many have a blaze of white

down the front of their faces. The famous Budweiser Clydesdales are a specific bay color and all markings are closely matched. Budweiser is very particular that their horses match specific conformation standards. Rates are \$140 for the trail rides. Tours start at \$200 for groups of one to four with arrangements of \$50 per person for larger groups.

Covell's is open Monday-Saturday by appointment only. Trail rides at 9 a.m. and 3 p.m., vehicle tour at noon. To book a ride or tour, text or call (805) 975-7332. For more information visit covellsclydesdaleranch.com or follow them on Facebook or Instagram.

Behind castle gates, a glimpse into the Gilded Age at Hearst Castle

Art, architecture, and the glamour of a golden era

Hearst Castle, one of California's world-famous landmarks, is not to be missed when visiting the Central Coast. The castle offers several tours, not counting privately arranged tours. Some of the most popular tours are wheelchair-accessible and accommodate visitors (with their support dogs) who have standing and mobility difficulties.

William Randolph Hearst started building the legendary estate on family ranchland overlooking the village of San Simeon in 1919. He called the estate "La Cuesta Encantada" - Spanish for The Enchanted Hill. By 1947, the hilltop complex included the iconic twin-towered main building, three guesthouses frequently occupied by Hollywood's famous, and 127 acres of terraced gardens, fountains, and pools.

Regular visitors to the castle

included a long list of Hollywood greats, political leaders such as Winston Churchill and Calvin Coolidge, and other notables such as Howard Hughes, George Bernard Shaw, Hedda Hopper, and Louella Parsons, wellknown gossip

columnists of their time. The castle was donated to the State of California in 1957 and managed by the California State Parks System. The doors first opened to the public in 1958. The castle sees over 850,000 visitors from all over the world every year.

Daytime tours include a viewing of the film "Hearst Castle – Building the Dream" in the Hearst Castle Theater at the visitor center. The film is not included in the evening tours but visitors who wish to see it can do so for a discounted cost.

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
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'Something a little more comfortable up on the hill'

The first 40,000 acres of the land was acquired by George Hearst in 1865. His son, William Randolph Hearst, inherited the original land and thousands more acres after his mother Phoebe Hearst, died from the Spanish flu in 1919. With subsequent land purchases, the entire property grew to around 250,000 acres.

In 1873, Phoebe took young William on a grand tour of Europe's castles, museums, and cultural centers, This voyage is believed to have inspired William's vision for the castle and grounds. Hearst's inspiration to hire Julia Morgan as the architect apparently came through Phoebe, who had hired Morgan to complete construction on a palatial residence in Pleasanton, California.

Hearst hired Morgan as the architect of the castle to create "something a little more comfortable up on the hill." Morgan





not only designed the castle on the hill but also the Hearst San Simeon property and other family properties. As one of America's preeminent architects, Morgan's designs graced private homes, college campuses, women's clubs, and religious buildings. The Julia Morgan tour highlights Morgan's gift for design and includes photographic displays of architectural drawings, family photos, and personal items.

It's no wonder Hearst was drawn to the accomplished Julia Morgan. Pheobe Hearst was a highly accomplished woman in her own right, founding the University of California Museum of Anthropology, and establishing libraries, among other major contributions.



Atascalero Outdoor activities abound

he city of Atascadero, originally founded by E.G. Lewis in the early 1900s as a utopian community, is a popular location for shopping, dining and strolls along the lake shore. Home to the Charles Paddock Zoo, the town has a large selection of restaurants offering a range of cuisine from rib-sticking American style to Asian, Mediterranean and more. Breweries, wine tasting, bakeries, antique stores, specialty shops, boutiques and art galleries are tucked away in locations along the main El Camino Real and on side streets around the Sunken Gardens. Popular area wineries are only a short drive from downtown and any of the town's several hotels.

Attractions Atascadero Lake Park

A 1.3-mile easy walk path circles the lake in the park providing views of the lake, the many varieties of birds that frequent the lake and other visiting wildlife. Bring binoculars; more than 48 species of birds have been sighted at the lake and recorded on ebirds.org. Leashed dogs are allowed and the path is also a favorite place for cyclists. The park has restrooms, small barbecue and recreation areas. The Faces of Freedom Veterans Memorial occupies the edge of the park facing Morro Road and is well worth a visit. The park is located at 9305 Pismo Ave, Atascadero just off of Morro Road (Highway 41).

Charles Paddock Zoo

The zoo is one of only 211 zoos accredited by the American Zoo and Aquarium Association, this zoo was founded in 1955 by Charles Paddock, a county park ranger who nursed injured wild animals back to health. Today, the zoo covers more than five acres. Many of the zoo residents are part of a world-wide program to preserve animals and their habitats. Some of these rare and endangered animals include the American Alligator and endangered owls and the Greater Roadrunner native to California. The zoo is located at 9100 Morro Rd, Atascadero. Historic City Hall

Atascadero's historic city hall is probably the city's best known historic building. Located at 6500 Palma Ave. and gracing the back of the Sunken Gardens, the doubledomed Italian Renaissance building was originally constructed in 1914 as the Atascadero Administration Building. After founder E.G. Lewis declared bankruptcy the building was purchased in 1927 and, over the years, served as three different private schools and a bank. It became the Veterans Memorial Building when acquired by the County of San Luis Obispo in 1954, and served as a community building. When the City of Atascadero incorporated in 1979, government offices occupied the building until it suffered major damage in the 2003 San Simeon Earthquake. After years of reconstruction and restoration, Historic City Hall opened again in 2013.






"Seven big medals at the biggest competitions in one year is definitely something we weren't expecting to accomplish," added Ryan. "We couldn't do it without our awesome team here and all our supporters and people that believed in us along the way even though things haven't always been easy or obvious that we were going to succeed."

empleton is the epitome of small town charm. Originally founded in 1886 as the last station on the southbound Southern Pacific Railroad, the town hosted horse drawn stagecoaches that met the trains and gave passengers a ride to San Luis Obispo to connect with the next stagecoach to their destinations. Even after the railroad extended the rails south to Santa Margarita in 1889, Templeton remained the shipping point for local crops and products bound eastward and to boats in shipping ports on the coast. Grain, wood, charcoal, fruit and cattle, driven from as far away as Kern County, arrived in Templeton for the next destination.

Many of the buildings from the late 1800s are still lining Main Street and housing unique shops, wineries and restaurants serving everything from hearty country breakfasts to dinner for every taste and the Templeton Historical Museum Society.







Olive oil tasting involves smelling the aroma of an oil, and then sipping it to taste its positive attributes. Official tasters drink the oil from dark blue glasses, to ensure they can't see the color of the olive oil (and be influenced by an oil's green or gold color).

Look for three qualities

Tasters should look for these three positive attributes:

Fruitiness: Any positive organic smell or taste.

Bitterness: A sign of freshness that is usually tasted on the sides of the tongue.

Pungency: A peppery, burning sensation in the throat.

Not all olive oils have all three of the attributes, but some should be present.Try it for yourself!! Grab that bottle you've had in the pantry for ages, and taste it to see if it's still good. Pour some into a wine glass– about an inch or two high – cover the glass with one hand while warming the base of the glass with the other. Place your nose into the glass after a minute and breathe in. Does it smell fruity, like green apples, cut grass, or tomato leaf? Great! Or does it smell unpleasant, like paint thinner, bacon, or a musty cellar? In that case, it's probably defective and should be thrown out.

Next, slurp in about a quarter of a teaspoon and let it sit on your tongue while you breathe in. Finally, swallow a bit and look for any signs of pepper in the throat. If an oil has a greasy feeling on your tongue, it's probably past its prime.



Remember, olive oil is a fresh product, much like a fruit juice. It needs to be used within 24 months of when it's made, and it needs to be used within a few months of opening the bottle.

From their first experience in the olive oil industry to today, Frank and Marti Menacho have a shared passion for helping others improve the taste and quality of their food. Celebrating 25 years of their Olivas de Oro Olive Company, this dynamic and innovative couple extends a special invitation to visitors and locals to visit their tasting room in Tin City just off Highway 101 and 46 West in Paso Robles.

"We love being part of Tin City," Marti says of the community of artisanal producers. "It's all about the makers and people who are just as passionate about their product as we are about ours."

That passion comes through loud and clear when the Menachos reflect on a journey that includes international recognition as olive oil sommeliers, earning more than 1000 competition medals, and offering the largest selection of olive oil from the oldest family-owned grower producer on the Central Coast. Frank served on the California Olive Oil Council tasting panel and as a competition judge.

Frank, a former commercial and wholesale fisherman, started his romance with olive oil while visiting upper-end restaurants and working with chefs from San Francisco to Carmel. Shifting careers, he purchased a friend's olive tree orchard in Oroville back in 1999.

"I joined experts at UC Davis and learned all I could about olives and olive oil," he said. "Marti came alongside to help me, and our passion and love for olive oil grew. The more we learned, the more we fell in love with it, and wanted to educate the consumer about the benefits of Extra Virgin Olive Oil (EVOO) from California."

Along with raising their three children, Frank tended the orchards and mill while Marti worked in high-tech during the week. The family spent most weekends at farmers' markets, doing educational road shows, and holding focus tastings.

In 2007, they transplanted 100-year-old olive trees to their property in Creston, opened a tasting room, and started providing services to fellow olive growers. They moved to Tin City in 2020 after a fire destroyed their tasting room.

"Then came the pandemic shutdowns and we had to get creative again with curbside pickups, mail orders, and sharing recipes and tips online," said Marti.

Tasting room fun and education

The Olivas de Oro tasting room vibe is about having fun and learning to improve the taste of food with flavorful and healthy ingredients. "We want our guests to have fun and leave with an experience they won't forget," Marti says. "We show them pairings of olive oil and vinegar and discuss how to use our products in everyday dishes."

Tastings are by appointment or on a walk-in basis. Guests are paired with a team member who discovers personal preferences and answers questions about olive oil and other products. "Guest relationships are important to us, and we provide individualized, personalized experiences," Marti says. "People can taste as many items as they want."

Relax on the patio, and enjoy a glass of local wine or beer from Tin City neighbors. Choose from a selection of hummus, olives, cheese, salami, tapenades, and more in an inviting and pleasant atmosphere.

Over the years, the Menachos have added chimichurris, jams, Dijon, tapenades, sea salts, rubs, grilling sauces, and more to their Ranch Product lineup.

Crafting artisan olive oils

Crafting high-quality artisan olive oil takes knowledge and patience. Frank takes care of the trees, keeps them healthy, tastes for ripening, and picks olives at their peak of freshness. The olives are milled within 24 hours, then the oil rests in containers for natural decantation. After about three months the finished product is transferred into drums.

"When I make our Mission Blend EVOO – a combination of our arbequina and mission olives – I blend different lots of oil to achieve a certain flavor profile. For flavored oils, I use just picked mission olives, and the fresh ingredient in the mill simultaneously." The difference between cold-pressed and infused olive oil comes out in the flavor. "An infused oil," said Frank, "loses its flavor when cooked. Cold pressed maintains the flavor."


"You get all the benefits of olive oil – the antioxidants and nutritional value – but whatever natural flavor you put in becomes the star of the show," he says, adding they source all of the produce for these oils from other California farmers. "Everything is fresh, and we believe it's important to buy local and know where your food comes from."












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Dracaena Wines, where the king of cabernet franc holds court

Dracaena Wines specializes in cabernet franc, and the Budds currently produce their Classic, Reserve, and Blanc de Franc, a white cab franc. The winery is also known for its chenin blanc, which the Budds decided to produce because of its Loire Valley relationship.

"Cab franc is king and she is his queen," Lori said. "Additionally, our customers love our Phoenix, which rises from the vineyard as a different wine every vintage. It can be a red, a white, a single variety, or a blend."

Each year, the Budds make a limited amount of their Phoenix

and when it sells out, it is gone forever. They also produce a tasty, direct-press grenache rosé.

Award-winning wines

As the founders of the internationally recognized Cab Franc Day, their passion is to promote the variety as more than a blending grape. Since their first 2013 vintage, Dracaena Wines has never received anything less than 90 points and has won multiple best-of-shows and double golds.

"We craft the wine that we would like to drink, but we understand there needs to be validation," Michael said. "So, we do submit to some of the largest competitions."

Two of their exceptional wines recently garnered gold medals at the San Francisco Chronicle Wine Competition, the largest wine competition in North America. Their 2022 Cinnabari is a masterfully blended cabernet sauvignon with cabernet franc and merlot, affectionately known as the "family tree wine." The 2022 Classic Cabernet Franc is an elegant expression of cabernet franc with a touch of petit verdot, showcasing complexity and balance.

"We are incredibly honored to receive these gold medals," Lori said. "Our mission has always been to produce wines that reflect our passion and dedication to excellence, and these awards affirm our journey."

In addition, the Budds offer a limited edition of their first-ever vertical of Classic Cabernet Franc featuring three acclaimed vintages. The 2013 and 2014 Classic Cabernet Franc earned 91 and 90 points respectively from Wine Enthusiast, while their 2015 is a double gold medal winner.

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Sculpterra Winery, where vision, wine and art flourish

A family's vision blends fine wine, stunning art, and a passion for giving

Family-owned and operated Sculpterra Winery and Sculpture Garden has become a destination for wine and art lovers since first opening for business in 2007.

With his wife, Kathy, by his side, Dr. Warren Frankel is the visionary and driving force behind the unique setting in Paso Robles. Their son, Paul Frankel, is the winemaker and vineyard manager, and their daughter, Faith Frankel, M.D. serves as the food pairing and tasting experience expert. Her husband, Truman Prewitt, handles all marketing and promotions for the business.

From dream to reality

"The winery was founded to support medical missions, Dr. Frankel's passion, and local art," Truman says. "Not too long ago, art options in Paso and San Luis Obispo County were scarce. Dr. Frankel wanted to change that."

And how did this idea for utilizing a winery and artwork to help others come to be? It's been a fabulous journey, indeed. While backpacking through Europe, a young Warren Frankel visited Frognear Park, a famous garden in Norway featuring sculptures by Gustav Vigeland. Spending hours in the garden with its many human forms, he was amazed by God's creation.

Eventually, his career path led him to serve in the United States Army where he received his training to become an army physician. Decades later, while practicing family medicine in Templeton, Dr. Frankel met John Jagger in church

after returning from a medical mission. Hearing about Jagger's artwork and dream of building a larger-than-life sculpture garden, the good doctor couldn't help but think how great that would be for the community.

It was during this same timeframe when his son decided to study viticulture and winemaking at Cal Poly SLO. Everything was lining up – make art to bring in people, make quality wine to pay for more art, and to support additional medical missions. Thus, Sculpterra Winery and Sculpture Garden was born.

An artist's vision

"The overall decor was more of the artist's vision to bring to the public," Prewitt says. "Jagger designed the garden and the general exterior. He started with what he thought was his best work, 'Morning Glory,' a sunning cat in the very front of the garden."

All of the cabinetry, doors, windows, the two 700-pound chandeliers, and metal work throughout the property were custom-built by Robert Bentley in his unique



old-world style. An abundance of art has been added over the years. Recent pieces include the Safari by Monte de Gallo with its nine animal sculptures, and the Stagecoach, which is perfect for interactive social media shots.

Award-winning wines

The artwork in the garden and inside the tasting room is stunning, and the award-winning wines are spectacular. Customer favorites include the viognier, grenache, and cabernet sauvignon. All are topsellers that tend to sell out quickly.

"The wines evolve every season, and seeing the wines change is a real treat," Winemaker Paul Frankel says. "Our viognier always pleases. It's become known as the red wine drinker's white."

Frankel points to his Paso Pink Rosé, a blend of grenache, syrah, and mourvèdre, as being "a great wine that is not too sweet or tart." He suggests the Petite Syrah for those who prefer a bit more boldness. Truman's go-to red wine is Figurine, a blend of primitivo, cabernet sauvignon, and merlot.

The Héroe label, consisting of a viognier, pinot noir, cabernet sauvignon, and primitivo, was created to honor all past and present production workers. Proceeds from sales support the Gold Coast Chapter of The Flying Samaritans which operates free medical clinics in Baja California, Mexico.

The family's commitment to giving back to their community and those in need is evident. As a veteran, Dr. Frankel values the importance of honoring those who have served their country and he is currently on the board at Camp Roberts Historical Museum. Various efforts at Sculpterra help support four artists on staff and four medical missions annually. A rotation of art from more than 100 local artists is also featured in the tasting room each year.

Welcoming and inviting atmosphere

The knowledgeable and professional tasting room staff strives for a high level of friendliness to accommodate all types of wine drinkers.

"With the high volume of tasting room traffic, and the amount of information to convey regarding the wine profile, winemaking process, medical missions, and a variety of art, it's essential to have the best staff," Truman explains. Eberle Winery, a tradition of great wine, conversation and hospitality

The legend of great cabernet and great hospitality continues

A Gary Eberle quotation on the wall at the Eberle Winery tasting room reads, "The difference between wine and children is you can sit down and reason with a bottle of cabernet." This quote speaks for all the Eberle wines and is a testament to Gary's passion for great wine, conversation, and hospitality, the traits that led to his being known as the godfather of Paso Robles wine.

"Have a glass of cabernet with me," is a sincere invitation from Gary to every visitor. He tries to spend a few hours every day meeting people and their dogs and can usually be


found seated at the entry to the dog-friendly tasting room, welcoming all.


After graduating from Penn State with a Bachelor of Science in Biology,

Gary studied cellular genetics at Louisiana State University. During this time, he discovered wine and decided to become a winemaker. Gary relocated to California to study enology at UC Davis and received his degree in 1973.

That same year Gary moved to Paso Robles and became a founding partner in Estrella River Winery & Vineyards. In the late 70s, Gary decided to venture out on his own. Taking his share of Estrella River Winery in the form of juice instead of a buyout allowed him to create wine under the Eberle label. He released his first wine, a cabernet sauvignon, in 1979.

In 1984, the Eberle Winery tasting room opened to the public, sporting the Eberle boar that has become the winery's logo and iconic, ubiquitous symbol. A sculpture and a





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
fountain bearing the boar adorn the grounds.

In German, Eberle means small boar. In Germanic culture, the boar symbolizes a warrior, and Garv Eberle has that warrior instinct. As a pioneer, he was the first to plant syrah on the Central Coast and to produce wine with 100% syrah in the United States. His cabernet sauvignon was the first to have the Paso Robles AVA designation placed on his label. Gary Eberle's passion for his winery, winemaking, Paso Robles, and the wine industry has earned him many honors, including the 2024 Paso Travel Distinguished Leader award, the 2020 American Legend Wine Star Award from the Wine Enthusiast, the California State Fair Lifetime Achievement Award, the Robert Mondavi Hospitality Award, and the Wine Industry Person of the Year from the Paso Robles Wine Country Alliance (PRWCA).

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
